In midwinter Mrs. Washington had driven into camp, come all the way from Virginia, with proper escort, in her coach and four, her horses bedstridden by black postillions in their livery of scarlet and white; and she had seemed to bring with her to the homely place not only the common sense habit, but the genial and hospitable air of Virginia as well.

By the 17th they were all embarked, 2000 troops and 200 loyal citizens of Boston, and had set sail towards the north for Halifax. They were obliged to leave behind them more than 200 cannon and a great quantity of military stores of every kind—powder, muskets, gun carriages, small arms—whatever an army might need.
