

OGDEN DEPARTMENT OF DENTISTRY ARRESTED; CHARGED WITH THEFT

May Prosecute Dr. E. T. Clark, Son of Farmington Banker.

Special to The Tribune. OGDEN, Feb. 14.—Information which is declared by the sheriff's officers to connect him with the robbery of Dr. E. T. Osgood's dental office in this city January 13 last has resulted in the arrest of Dr. E. T. Clark, a dentist, formerly located in this city. He was brought to Ogden this afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Thomas DeVine, following his arrest in Salt Lake, and is now confined in the county jail.

A complaint has not yet been filed and relatives of the man under arrest are endeavoring to secure his release. Osgood declared this evening that he would push the prosecution provided the authorities have been able to identify the supplies taken from the dental office were valued at \$200, according to Dr. Osgood. Some of the property was sold to Salt Lake dentists and others to the sheriff's officers, and a portion of it was found in possession of Dr. Clark at the time of his arrest.

Dr. Clark, who is a son of A. L. Clark, president of the bank at Farmington, Davis county, left the city shortly after the robbery of the dental office. A short time previous to that he had given up the practice of his profession in this city and his name was not known to the authorities. His suspicion was not directed toward him until a few weeks ago, when he is said to have posed as another Osgood dentist in the city, and to have sold dental supplies which tallied with the description of those taken from the local office.

VISIT IN MEXICO. Ogden Travelers Describe Queer Fort of Federal Troops.

Special to The Tribune. OGDEN, Feb. 14.—Robert A. Moves, cashier of the Commercial National bank, and Mrs. Moves have returned to Ogden after an extended trip through southern California. For the purpose of viewing the results of the war in Mexico, they crossed the border at the city of Tijuana, where a small company of the federal troops are now stationed.

Their fort, or rather the tumble-down adobe structure in which they eat and sleep, is regarded by the American tourists as not being a very imposing one. According to Mr. Moves, it would not afford as much protection against a fusillade of bullets as a house constructed of stone. The soldiers are regarded as dirty and about four feet in height entirely around the effect of the blighting frost on the orange and lemon orchards south of San Bernardino was most devastating, according to the Ogden travelers. Very little of the crop has been saved, and the stances entire orchards have been wiped out. No section of southern California escaped, the damage extending as far south as many cities in Mexico.

WANT TO SUPPLY LIGHT. Utah Power & Light Company Proposes to Furnish White Water Current.

Whitaker of the Utah Light & Railway company believes that the "great white" lighting system would be considerably less costly than the present system. Relative to the matter, Manager Whitaker has submitted the following statement to the city commissioners: "Regarding the proposed special lighting of streets, we respectfully request the privilege of submitting to you a plan of lighting which we believe to be the most economical and efficient. The plan is based on the fact that the city is in a position to supply luminous arcs for the above mentioned streets."

Locked Up for Selling Locks. Special to The Tribune. OGDEN, Feb. 14.—Thomas Woods, who claims Reading, Pa., as his home city, was arrested by Detective Charles P. Cook and George Wardlaw this morning shortly after he had disposed of six brass locks, valued at \$5, to a local second-hand store. The locks had been consigned from Chicago to the American Express company in Salt Lake, Woods claiming that they were for the railroad yards at Salt Lake. Woods is locked at the city jail and probably will be charged with petty larceny.

Stallion Case Settled. Special to The Tribune. OGDEN, Feb. 14.—After a trial lasting more than two weeks the case of the Rocky Mountain Stud Farm company of Ogden vs. H. E. Lund and twenty other residents of Iron county was decided today, when verdicts were returned by Judge N. J. Harris and the jury. The case was brought before the jury as to thirteen of the defendants, rendering judgment against them in the sum of \$424.90, and to the remaining eight defendants, the jury, after deliberating two hours, returned a verdict in favor of the defendants for \$1019.96. The plaintiff company brought suit to recover \$2028.69 on a stallion purchased in August, 1910. Under the finding of the court and jury the litigation will net the company about \$1500.

Double Tracking Pushed. Special to The Tribune. OGDEN, Feb. 14.—J. L. Whitman, who has charge of the double tracking on the Salt Lake division of the Southern Pacific, reports that the additional track between Ogden and West Weber, a distance of 28.5 miles, has been practically completed and will be turned over to the operating department within the next ten days. The improvement is regarded as very important because of the relief that it will afford the Ogden terminal.
