ACCEPT SERVICES OF BOARD OF MEDIATION
 NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—The services of the state board of mediation, which is making an effort to settle the strike of garment workers, in progress here since early January, were accepted last night by representatives of the United Garment Workers of America. The state board sent letters to both sides in the controversy, asking them to agree to a conference looking to a settlement. A favorable reply speedily was forthcoming from representatives of the garment workers. Representatives of the manufacturers said they would answer today.

HOUSE DOORKEEPER COMMITS SUICIDE
 WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Capt. A. P. Garden, assistant doorkeeper of the house, was found dead in his rooms late last night with his throat cut. An incoherent note, evidently hastily scribbled just before the deed, indicated that he had taken his life while temporarily deranged. Garden was appointed from Wheeling, W. Va., and was to have been appointed United States marshal within the near future.
