ARGUMENTS CLOSED IN HARVESTER CASE

(Continued from Page One.)

When these defendants purposely entered into this organization, into this conspiracy, they laid themselves liable to a charge of guilt for the result.

Bancroft Is Heard.

Edgar A. Bancroft of Chicago, general counsel for the harvest company, concluded his address, with a review of the trade conditions from the time of the inception of the International Harvester company up to the time of the filing of the government's suit, and declared that the evidence disproved nearly every individual assertion of guilt made by the government.

He admitted that at the beginning of the concern's career some things may have been done by the five division managers which were not exactly right under the law.

"I desire to impress on the court that at the beginning there existed great rivalry between these five division managers, each, probably, had a vision of possibly being raised to the general management of the big new corporation. And, doubtless these five division managers for a short time did business as it had been done for years. Those methods of competition were not always gentlemanly and no doubt these division managers played the game without limit or control. It is to this period that nearly all the government's letters and other exhibits refer.

Conditions Ameliorated.
"But these conditions were not created, but ameliorated by the International Harvester company, instead of being made worse.

"Why, the record shows that the unfair methods in selling twine of eight state penitentiaries were vastly worse than anything that has been alleged against the International Harvester company."

Judge Hook interrupted Mr. Bancroft at this juncture to state: "I don't suppose there ever has been a business of any sort that has not had some of this sort of thing. But the question before this court is whether there was enough of it by the International Harvester company to make this concern guilty under the provisions of the Sherman law."

John P. Wilson, during his summing up for the defense, predicted a price war between harvester manufacturing firms.

"Whether this price is granted or not," said Mr. Wilson, "there will be in the next few years competition in these lines such as the world has never seen. War is now on, not only in agricultural implements, but in harvester lines which is going to be the fiercest ever known."

At the conclusion of Mr. McReynolds's argument court was adjourned, and the case was taken under advisement. Mr. McReynolds expected to depart for the east late tonight.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 5.—Jail officials received instructions today to ship to Tampa, Fla., all the effects of Ortie E. McManigal, the confessed dynamiter and writer against the McNamara brothers and other labor union men in the national dynamite conspiracy, who was taken from the prison Monday. Supplementary information from sources gave McManigal's destination as Havana, Cuba, whence it was said he was due to sail for South America.

The report of the alienists has been taken under advisement by the civil judge, who, it is expected, will liberate Zepeda.

A former decision by the alienists against Zepeda was set aside a month ago and a new inquiry was ordered.

Important Order Issued.
NOGALES, Ariz., Nov. 5.—Officers commanding the United States troops on border patrol received orders today to prepare equipment for field service. Railroad officials at division headquarters at Tucson also received requests for immediate statements regarding the facilities they could furnish for movement of troops.

Explanation Is Made.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—At the army general staff offices, it was said the only preparations for troop movements being made were those of exchanges of posts.

Carranza Wants Arms.
NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico, Nov. 5.—At the request of General Venustiano Carranza, the constitutionalist chief, Henry Allen Tupper of the International Peace Forum telegraphed Secretary of State Bryan today as follows:

"Carranza makes only this request—that our government permit the free importation into Mexico of arms and equipment. His case gives positive aid under the circumstances, of speedy peace and stable constitutional government, and he deprecates intervention as a grave and disastrous mistake."

Federals in Control.
SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 4.—There were no indications of an epidemic at Guaymas when the American naval collier Nausan left the Mexican port a short time ago. The Nausan arrived here today on the way to San Francisco, and Captain Pruden reported that the federals were in complete control of the city when he sailed.

The Nausan brought three American refugees.

France to Keep Off.
PARIS, Nov. 5.—The French foreign office was asked informally today by the Mexican foreign office if it was disposed to mediate between the United States and Mexico. The French government has taken the attitude that it will do nothing until further advised as to the policy of the United States toward Mexico, and then nothing which might be unwelcome.

Legal Tender Increased.
MEXICO CITY, Nov. 5.—President Huerta, by a decree today, made silver 50-cent pieces legal tender, as well as the bank notes of the Bank of London and the National bank.

Branches of these banks are authorized to put out their notes as legal tender. It is specified that although a metal reserve will be retained by the bank, the notes shall not be redeemed in specie for one year.

The decree sets forth that this has been rendered necessary because of the high rate of exchange and the tendency of the public to melt down silver pesos, which contain more than twice the amount of metal contained in the 50-cent piece.

Greeks Bound Over.
Niek and Frank Soter, Greeks, of Midvale, who were arrested October 29 by the United States marshal for the alleged theft of seven cases of shoes from a freight car, were given a preliminary hearing yesterday before United States Commissioner Charles H. Baldwin. They were bound over to the grand jury in the sum of \$500 each, and their case will be heard next week.
