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### NEBRASKA IS VICTOR OVER OLD ENEMIES

#### Kansas Eleven Puts Up Desperate Battle, but Fails to Count.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Nov. 15.—The University of Nebraska football team defeated the University of Kansas here this afternoon, 9 to 0, in a game mostly of straight, old-fashioned football, played on a field ankle deep in mud, under a drizzle of rain. Both teams repeatedly made first downs, but Nebraska's work at crucial points in the game was the better. The northern players frequently circled the Kansas ends for good gains, and the Kansas line was shattered repeatedly by the plunging Nebraska backs. Kansas played fiercely, particularly in the third period, when three first downs were made in succession. Nebraska attempted many open plays, but failed repeatedly to work the forward pass and lost ground on fake kicks. Because of the wet ball and uncertain footing, fumbling was frequent and both sides often were penalized for off-side plays and holding.

### SOUTH DAKOTA LOSES TO MICHIGAN AGGIES

#### Season Is Most Successful for M. A. C.; Claim Western Championship.

LANSING, Mich., Nov. 15.—The Michigan Agricultural college eleven today ended the most successful season in the history of the institution by defeating South Dakota, 19 to 7. The conquerors of Michigan and Wisconsin were forced to their limit to triumph over the powerful warriors from the north. M. A. C. started the game with a rush, scoring a touchdown in the first period and another in the second, but failed to kick either goal. South Dakota braced in the third quarter and showed a clever offense, finally pushing the ball across the "aggie's" goal. The goal was kicked and the period closed without further scoring. M. A. C. made her last touchdown during the closing minutes of play and added a point to her count by kicking the goal. Earlier in the season Notre Dame defeated South Dakota, 20 to 7. Both Notre Dame and M. A. C. claim the western football championship.

### DENVER "U" LOSES TO COLORADO COLLEGE

DENVER, Nov. 15.—By persistent line bucking, Colorado college defeated Denver university here today by a score of 21 to 8. Denver's only points came in the last period, when Bingham's dropkick from the thirty-yard line was blocked and the ball rolled over the goal line, where Meason fell on it for a safety.

#### Veteran Is Master Except in Eighth, When He Allows Four Hits.

Mathewson was freely hit, but he kept the bingles well scattered. He was accorded great support by his teammates. The Giants got away with a run in the first inning, and at one time it looked like they would gather two or three. 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### PENN STATE KEEPS NAVY SCORE DOWN

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 15.—Pennsylvania State held the Navy to a 19-to-0 score here today and the game was not one in which the Navy supporters can find much comfort. State was the first eleven this season to nearly equal the Navy and the midshipmen when met by real opposition, but did not show as well as it was hoped they would. In the line bucking Navy showed fullback Harrison across for a touchdown in the first period and tight guard Brown kicked goal. Brown was called on for a placement goal in the second period, after State held for downs inside the ten-yard line. In the fourth period the visitors five times held for downs inside their own one-yard line. These rock-stopped defenses were the best exhibitions seen here for a long time.

### WASHINGTON DEFEATS OREGON UNIVERSITY

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15.—The University of Washington defeated Oregon university at football today, 10 to 7, and won the Northwest conference championship. Not until the fourth quarter was the mastery decided. Then Charles Smith, a powerfully built Washington junior, substituting at quarterback, shot a place kick between the Oregon goal posts from a twenty-two-yard line and broke up a 1-to-1 tie.

### JORDAN WILL MEET KETONEN ON DEC. 5

Promoter Harry Heagren has decided to get back into the promotion game again and has booked Waino Ketonen, the champion middleweight of Finland, and Chris Jordan, former United States champion, for a finish wrestling match, to take place at the Garrick theater on the night of December 5. This match should prove to be a highly interesting contest. Ketonen wrestled with Jordan for an hour and thirty minutes to a draw about a year ago. Yokel himself admits that Ketonen is one of the toughest propositions in the middle-weight division today. Promoter Heagren was angling for a good man to meet Yokel for the return match for the championship. Yokel states that he wanted to meet some good men and gradually wrestle himself back into condition so that he could eventually take Jordan on again. According to Heagren, he said that he would rather take on anyone else than the Finlander. It was then that Heagren brought Tom Long here and matched him with Yokel. Ketonen is credited with a peculiar style, which will wrestlers agree is one of the hardest holds in the wrestling game to avoid. Ketonen has been trying for some time to get a match with Yokel for the championship, but this far has been unsuccessful. He is determined to make Yokel meet him. If he beats Jordan, Yokel's friends will demand that Yokel meet the Finlander. Jordan is willing to take on any of the best middleweights that the local promoter sees fit to match him with, thereby hoping to establish his right to another trial at the title. Both Jordan and Ketonen are aiming for the same goal and a real blood match is assured.

### WESTERNERS AGAIN BEAT EASTERNERS

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov. 15.—Using the same line attack that crushed Syracuse, the football eleven of the University of Michigan today defeated Pennsylvania, 13 to 0. Michigan simply battered the defense of the easterners to pieces. At no time during the game was Pennsylvania even dangerous. Pennsylvania's attack was erratic and her defense was mediocre. Now and then, at wide intervals, one of Brooke's men skirted a Michigan end for six or seven yards gain. Attempts to pierce Michigan's line were so unsuccessful during the first half that they were practically abandoned during the final period. Pennsylvania, the same as Michigan, gained little from forward pass plays. It was a distinct victory for old-fashioned, sledge hammer football. Case Is Defeated. ### ALBION WINS FROM ACADEMY OF IDAHO


POCATELLO, Idaho, Nov. 15.—With victory three times in its grasp here this afternoon, the Academy of Idaho lost the annual football game to Albion State Normal by the margin of one point. The score was 7 to 6. The academy team worked the forward pass to perfection, while the Albion team, outweighting the academy boys over fifteen pounds to the man, played old-style football and made all its gains by plunging the line. The academy team scored a touchdown by Roubideaux at the end of eight minutes' play, while the Albion touchdown came in the second half and was the result of a recovered fumble on the academy ten-yard line. Toubious missed a difficult goal, while Bangs, for Albion, kicked an easy goal. The academy advanced the ball almost twice as far as its opponents and were on Albion's five-yard line three times without scoring. The ball was on Albion's fifteen-yard line when time was called. This is the first football victory for Albion against the academy in five years. Vincent and Crutchen, from Blackfoot, were the officials. The attendance was 600.
