**OLD-TIME "REVIVAL" IS NOW IN PROGRESS**

Being Carried Out in the Wards of Ensign Stake in Order to Increase Enrollment.

For the purpose of rejuvenating the Mutual Improvement associations of Ensign stake, an old-fashioned "revival" is in progress and will continue for the next ten days. The movement has been under way for some weeks, and will continue until Tuesday, December 16, when it is believed that the enrollment and attendance will surpass all previous records. Two special events are planned for the present week as a part of the "revival" movement, and both promise to be well supported. The most important event of the entire campaign is planned for Friday night. At this time a Mutual Improvement reunion and social will be held in every ward of Ensign stake with the exception of the Twelfth-Thirteenth, where conflicting arrangements made it necessary to select another date.

It is planned to have programmes presented that will include short talks, select musical and literary numbers, and a ball. All former officers of both Young Men's and Young Ladies' Mutual Improvement associations in the various wards are to be the guests of honor, and short talks will be made by as many as time will permit. The first part of the evening will be devoted to a programme composed principally of musical and literary numbers, which are a part of the regular work, and the best talent in the city available is being secured for the renditions. Following the formal programme, the social and ball will occupy the evening. As a part of the social, refreshments are to be served by the young ladies. The two organizations have joined hands to make the reunions in each of the wards big successes.

On Wednesday evening the stake board of the Young Men's association will tender a reception and dance to all general stake officers, bishops and

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counsellors, and all ward officers both Young Men's and Young Ladies' associations. This social will be in the Twelfth-Thirteenth ward apartment hall, and will serve as a prelude to the reunion in the ward. "Revival" movement will close December 16, when special efforts will be made to establish new records enrollment and attendance. The "revival" is being extensively advertised throughout the stake, and a great deal of interest and enthusiasm has aroused.
