THOMAS MORGAN OF TEXAS

Recluse Left Money in Bank, but Papers Bestowing It Are Missing.

Thomas Morgan, an aged employee of the Utah Light & Railway company, died in this city during June, 1912. For fifteen years he had lived in Big Cottonwood canyon, in a little cabin, all alone.

He seldom associated with anyone, and then only in the most casual way. He was very reticent about himself, and no one knew much concerning him, except that he was always faithful to his duties and appeared to be a man of considerable character and was very kindly.

In June, 1912, Mr. Morgan decided to go to California on an excursion with the B. P. O. E. He left his hotel for the depot with two grips, or suit cases; but before he departed he was suddenly seized with an illness which resulted in his death at St. Mark's hospital.

One of the grips was found, but no trace can be discovered of the other. Prior to his death Mr. Morgan told various persons that he had left his fortune to Mrs. Bertha B. Handley of 539 Post street, this city.

Diligent search, however, among all of his personal effects has been made without finding the important document. It is thought that if the missing suit case can be found the last testament of Mr. Morgan may be found in it, as every other conceivable place has been searched.

Mr. Morgan left many thousands of dollars on deposit in a local bank, and as no relative in any degree can be found, the entire fortune will be turned over to the state, unless the law firm of Marioneaux, Stott, McKinney & Powers has investigation of the case in charge, and persons interested in the matter may obtain further information at the office in the Kennerly building.
