

SUBCOMMITTEE IS DEADLOCKED HARD AND FAST

Democrats and Republicans Investigating the Strike in Michigan Divided; Fifth Member Called.

MANY WITNESSES YET TO BE HEARD

Counsel for Owners Continues to Inject the Question of Socialism Into the Proceedings.

HOUGHTON, Mich., Feb. 14.—Emil Strang and James Jensen, employees of the Superior mine, near Houghton, were arrested today on a charge of murder.

HANCOCK, Mich., Feb. 14.—Finding the congressional subcommittee investigating the Michigan copper strike deadlocked on the question of making a full inquiry into the Italian hall disaster at Calumet on Christmas eve, Chairman Taylor today sent a telegram to Representative Foster, chairman of the house committee on mines and mining, urging the necessity of the immediate presence of Representative Hamlin of Missouri, the absent committee member.

It developed tonight that Chairman Taylor and Congressman Casey of Pennsylvania have taken the stand that it is within the province of the committee to admit into the record everything pertaining to the seven subjects under inquiry.

Committee Deadlocked.

Mr. Taylor and Mr. Casey agreed that the request should be complied with, although Representative Howell of Utah, the only Republican member here at the time, expressed himself as opposed to taking up all the disagreeable details of the calamity again.

Legion of Witnesses.

A short day's session today was devoted by the committee to hearing six more strikers, who gave testimony as to working conditions in the mines, which they described as bad.

Should the committee decide on Monday that it has heard enough evidence from the strikers' side along the line to which a week's time already has been devoted, another subject will be taken up.

"We cannot recognize the Western Federation of Miners because it is Socialist in its aims and tendencies and because it is made up in this district largely of Socialists," declared A. P. Rees of counsel for the mining companies at the congressional strike investigation this morning.

The statement was made in explanation of a question asked of a witness to which A. W. Kerr of counsel for the

copper mine strikers, objected on the ground that it was part of an effort to show that the strike was "fostered and fanned by red socialism."

It was the same asked of another witness yesterday, arousing similar objection: "Are you a member of the Finnish Socialist society?"

Jahn Jaubihnen, the witness, was told he need not answer the question unless he desired. The witness replied, however, that he did not belong to the society. He thought its name was Jousi. He did not know its membership.

Mr. Kerr objected vigorously to the line of cross-examination. "At the inception of the strike," he said, "the mining companies made no claim that it was being conducted by 'red socialism.' They set up that cry a few weeks ago when every other resort had been exhausted."

Is there anything degrading in a man's admitting that he is a Socialist? asked Congressman Switzer.

"No," replied Mr. Kerr, "but these questions are being asked simply to confuse the issue."

Mr. Switzer expressed the opinion that if witnesses introduced belonged to organizations which had for their object the overthrow of the government of the United States, the committee ought to know it.

Chairman Taylor agreed with him, but doubted whether a witness could be forced to answer questions along this line without infringing on his rights under our form of government.


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PROPOSED FACTORY OF THE UTAH GLASS COMPANY TO BE BUILT AT MORONI, UTAH.

Supreme Court Grants Writ of Prohibition, Which Stops Proceedings.

Chairman Takes Action.

DENVER, Feb. 14.—Representative Foster, chairman of the house committee on mines and mining, tonight telegraphed Representative Hamlin of the committee to proceed immediately to Hancock, Mich., to break the deadlock in the subcommittee of the mines committee on the question of a full investigation of the Italian hall disaster.

In the event Mr. Hamlin could not start at once, Mr. Foster, in a second telegram, instructed Representative Taylor of Arkansas to go to the assistance of the subcommittee at Hancock, Mich.

BRYAN NEARLY DRINKS GLASS OF CHAMPAGNE

Wife Springs From Her Place at Banquet and Stops Liquor at His Lips.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—With a glass of champagne almost to his lips, William Jennings Bryan was prevented from drinking the wine tonight by the quick action of his wife.

The incident took place at the first annual dinner given by the Authors' League of America. Four hundred attended, and Winston Churchill presided. In the course of his speech the guest of honor reached for a drink of water. Unadvertently he picked up a glass of champagne. Mrs. Bryan, seeing her husband's mistake, sprang from her place, two seats away from the secretary, and, hurrying there, put her hand over the glass just as it was about to reach his lips.

Mr. Bryan looked surprised for an instant, then laughingly picked up a glass of water.

Pioneer Passes Away.

EPIPHRAIM, Feb. 14.—Jens Anderson, one of the pioneer and highly respected citizens of this community, died at his home this afternoon of general debility. Mr. Anderson was born in Sweden April 29, 1853. When a young man he joined the Mormon church, immigrating to Utah in 1861. He was active during the Black Hawk Indian war and later was called to settle Circle Valley. He was a member of the Ephraim city council. The arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made.

BRITISH MARINES LAND AT VERA CRUZ

Small Legation Guard With Machine Guns Put Ashore From Warship.

U. S. DOES NOT OBJECT

Federal Troops Gathering for Guerrilla Warfare Against the Rebels.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—The dispatch of a small legation guard of marines and machine guns from a British cruiser at Vera Cruz to the legation in Mexico City was ordered only after the state department had been advised of the plan through the American embassy in London.

Threats that the British legation would be made a particular object of attack in the event of a public uprising led to the precautionary measure, and it was intimated at the state department today that Mexican authorities were not only willing but anxious that other diplomatic representatives in Mexico take similar measures.

It was thought possible American residents might urge Charge O'Shaughnessy to ask for a legation guard if the action of the Mexican officials had been communicated to him, which could not be officially confirmed tonight. Captain Harry McL. P. Huse, who has been on duty at the naval war college at Newport, was ordered to proceed to Vera Cruz today to become chief of staff to Rear Admiral Fletcher, commanding the American squadron. The post is a new one.

A letter from Admiral Fletcher dated February 4 and received at the navy department today, said the epidemic of smallpox and typhoid fever was still raging at Tampico. He said the federal government comprised about 200 men and that there were 2000 rebels in the vicinity who were apparently waiting for reinforcements.

Secretary Garrison is seeking information regarding the recently reported filibustering expedition into Mexico near El Paso in 100 automobiles. He is frankly incredulous and has called upon General Bliss for report.

Rate Increased.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 14.—Exchange on New York today closed at three for one, and a short time previously touched 3.10.

It is explained that the increase was not due to the demand of the concerns having foreign payments to meet so much as to the fact that shippers of Hennequin, who have heretofore distributed their exchange business, have opened an office of their own, thus creating something like a corner.

Bankers believe that the exchange rates will increase still further. Certain diplomats have been unofficially advised that the government is planning to issue fiat fractional currency and also impose a special tax on all investments in the federal district.

Chief interest in the military operations centers in plans of the war department for a campaign around Torreon. A federal victory of minor importance is reported from Tepic on the west coast, and the skirmish has taken place near San Angel, a suburb of the capital, in which the rebels were forced to flee.

Federals Gathering.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Feb. 14.—Federal troops are gathering in the Cajon Bouit district near the Sonora-Chihuahua state boundary for guerrilla warfare against the constitutionalists, according to reports which reached here today.

that the federal guerrillas had been augmented by seventy-five men who left Douglas in the last week, well equipped with arms and ammunition, part of which was carried by a train of pack animals.

Constitutionalist Agent Lelievre announced here today that 7000 insurgents had been enlisted for the Chihuahua expedition, according to official reports transmitted to him. He said the constitutionalists would begin concentrating at Agua Prieta, Sonora, next week.

Constitutionalist money is selling here for from 30 to 35 cents a peso. Since some mining companies operating in the northwestern part of Mexico have met their pay rolls with the currency of the insurgents the demand for their issues has increased.

HUERTA WILL STOP ATTACKS ON WILSON

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 14.—Charge O'Shaughnessy made a protest today to President Huerta against the newspaper Imparcial, which continues to publish personal attacks on President Wilson. The charge went to the president, who assured him that he regretted the attacks and would see that they were stopped.

General Huerta said he would not tolerate such attacks upon the president of the United States any more than he would similar attacks upon himself.
