

SPENDS AFTERNOON

MANAGER HAIRE OF MICHIGAN-UTAH SEES STORM FROM ELEVATED PERCH.

Norman W. Haire, managing director of the Michigan-Utah at Alta, has had an experience in that camp Wednesday that was not down on the itinerary of his visit there, but which he insists was merely one of the incidents of mining life among the summits of the Wasatch.

The storm at Alta that day was characterized by a strong wind and a heavy fall of snow. When Haire was ready to leave the mine at 1 o'clock in the afternoon to start on his return home, the snow was so deep that he concluded he would ride down in one of the buckets of the tram.

At this interesting moment the bucket in which Mr. Haire was perched was thirty feet past a sixty-foot tower and about seventy-five feet from the ground. He waited a while patiently, then for a time impatiently, for the tram to get busy again, but it never budged.

After two and a half hours a young man sent from the mine reached the scene, and mounting the tower, managed by means of wire to sufficiently support the lower cable that Mr. Haire, though by this time beginning to be benumbed by the cold, was able to work his way to the tower, from which he descended in safety.

WOOLLEY HAS CHANCE TO TRY SNOWSHOES

K. C. Woolley, who arrived from Salt Lake yesterday, left for the Nay Aug group of mines this morning, says the Wood River Times. He expected to get to the Clearcreek Springs today and from there on to go on skis either today or tomorrow.

Mr. Woolley represents himself and associates of Salt Lake, who own the Nay Aug, J. J. Baker, also one of the owners, has been at the mines with two men since about the first of January. He has over a carload of high-grade ore on the dump and he reports the mine looking well.

Baker's report, Mr. Woolley says, makes him somewhat anxious to increase the force at work, and if he can get supplies up to the mines he will open three or four men to the force, to open up the ground so that more can be put on after the breaking up of the roads.

TWO DAYS DAILY FROM COLUMBUS CON

New Strike Made by Wade & Tibby Yielding Generously.

Wade & Tibby, who have a lease on the old Columbus Consolidated portion of the Wasatch Mines company's estate at Alta, are taking out about twenty tons of ore a day.

This ore is coming from the new body recently opened above the tunnel level. It is a lead carbonate and yield about \$20 smelter net. The ore as it is mined is put in the bins and from there it is being moved steadily by trains eight miles to the railroad loading station at Wasatch.

The ore body from which this extraction is being made is now four feet thick and has a face of twenty-five feet. It is being followed upward on its incline and it is thought probable the ore will continue nearly to the surface, a distance on the incline of over 300 feet. Eight miners are now employed and it is intended to increase the force the first of next week.

MINNESOTA SHAFT IS GOING DOWN DEEPER

Work of sinking in the Minnesota shaft of the Coppermine is now going along in good shape and will be pushed as rapidly as possible, according to the Ely Examiner. The shaft was 315 feet deep and it is the intention to send it down 150 feet more, where a station will be cut and at which depth drifts will be run to further open up the deposit of high-grade copper ore in which development work has been done for several years through the shaft.

LUCKY DEPOSIT HAS DEVELOPMENT WORK AT MONTANA MINE

Salt Lakers Busy Developing Promising Property Just Over State Line.

Out in the desert hills of the eastern part of White Pine county, Nevada, twenty miles or so from the Utah state line, is the Lucky Deposit mining property, owned by L. G. Hardy of this city and associates.

They have been working there for a year and last summer shipped five carloads of silver-lead ore that yielded about \$2100. The fifty-mile wagon haul to Currie on the Nevada Northern was too expensive and that part of the proposition was abandoned, although the ore was not by any means exhausted. Mr. Hardy, however, is at an expense of about \$5000 a road could be built that would reach the railroad in seventeen miles.

At another location on the property is a twenty-two-foot vein of copper which at the surface assayed 10 per cent. Four months ago they began development work here by a tunnel cross-cutting the vein in its dip. This was carried in fifty-five feet, then a winze was sunk thirty-four feet and from the bottom of the winze a drift on the vein has now progressed ten feet. The vein dips at an angle of thirty degrees and all these workings are in ore assays of which, at a depth from the surface, of sixty feet, run as high as 15 per cent copper.

The vein rests on a bed of quartzite over 1000 feet thick and is overlain by the blue limestone. The vein is entirely in a carbonaceous ore, but at a depth of three feet in the winze the sulphide was struck and the rest of the work is in ore of that class. The property contains 2000 acres, but only about 1000 are owned by the company. They have something that will develop into a big property. The ore is said to possess excellent concentrating qualities.

DEVELOPMENT WORK AT MONTANA MINE

BUREKA, Feb. 27.—Some development work is being done at the Montana property in the eastern end of the district, the ground being owned by E. C. Richmond and associates. There are fourteen claims in the group and it is undoubtedly as good as anything in that part of Tintic, being in line for the southern extension of the vein that has already been encountered in the Tintic Standard property. The Montana claims were formerly controlled by local people, among whom were Joseph J. H. Morgan, H. J. H. Morgan, and Bert Smith. During the time that things were booming in that part of the district a splendid hoisting plant was installed and a shaft sunk to a depth of about 250 feet.

The severe storms of the past week resulted in the suspension of work on the new reservoir that is being constructed near the Chief Consolidated mine. James Morgan, who has a contract for the necessary grading, states that the work will be resumed just as soon as the weather is favorable. The reservoir is almost completed and it can easily be finished within a few days. Consolidated management believes that the reservoir will be filled by the spring thaws and that with the usual amount of rain the place can be kept partially filled throughout the year. It will mean a substantial saving in the company's operating expenses, as a large sum is expended annually for water.

McDONALD ELY DRIFT IS IN HARD GROUND

At the McDonald Ely property near Lane City two shafts are working regularly down the Golden Gate shaft says the Ely Examiner. It is understood that a drift is being run at 320 feet to reach the area under the ore deposit, about 100 feet from the surface. The drift is being driven by hand and is now reported to be out fifty feet from the shaft and in a very hard formation, according to the evidence seen of the dump. Within a short distance, however, it is expected the drift will enter a softer formation and then progress will be more rapid. No information regarding the property is given out by the local management, but it is generally understood by people who have been watching this property that the ore body to which the drift is being run is extensive and of shipping grade. It will be necessary to drive a total distance of about 300 feet to tap it and then the company is expected to systematically prospect it in several directions.

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MINING OUTLOOK ON WOOD RIVER FINE

Famous Old Idaho Mining District Sees Real Revival Near at Hand.

Not in ten years has the mining outlook for this region been as favorable as it is at this time, declares the Wood River Times.

The Plughoff & Reed mine at Glendale shows steady improvement. The ore vein cut last week on the 100-foot level shows ore a foot in width where cut, and the ore is widening as drifted upon. This taps a shoot that extends from the surface, but upon which no work worth mentioning has been done. Another carload of ore was shipped from this mine last week and the output could be increased and cheaply were there a hoist and pump on the property, and so continued to contribute to the district with its expense. But Mr. Plughoff, having been repeatedly disappointed in mining, he has become so conservative that he insists that the \$25,000 or so required to construct a hoist, put in a pump and sink another 100 feet must come out of the mine.

The Croesus mines and mill will undoubtedly keep fifty to 100 men at work through the spring opening. Rock Creek should employ at least twenty this year. State Mine Inspector Bell has a party to take H. R. Plughoff's mine and O'Neil, Westlake & Clark have been showing interest in the property. The Clipper, the Hudson, Treasure, Danaher & Warning and other Little Smoky properties promise much for this summer. They will employ a few men and may give work to fifty or sixty, possibly more.


The Red Elephant and the Bullion properties will keep at least as many men as usual at work. The Nay Aug and other Deer Creek mines should employ at least twenty-five and possibly 100 men. The Boston-Idaho mines and mill will increase the working force forty or fifty.

The Boulder mill and mines, including Charles Cuneo's Million, promise to give employment to twenty or thirty men. The Independence mines and mill will keep a force of twenty-five to fifty busy. The Nouday, the North Star and a score of other properties will give employment to a dozen or more men apiece. If the price of lead and silver does not fall too low—much lower than they are now—Wood River may see a general reawakening of interest in the mining industry.
