in Hyrum the school contains about
forty-five students and three teachers;
Smithfield, fifty students and four teachers;
Lewiston, fifteen students and two
teachers; and Wellsville, about sixty stu-
dents and four teachers. He says that
the approximate number of high school
students in the county is now 200. If
Richmond and Hyrum were selected for
the two main schools, the high schools
would not be any too large, as Richmond
would draw from 125 to 150 students and
Hyrum perhaps seventy, figuring
upon a probable increase in attendance.

Meeting at Hyrum.
A meeting has been called to be held
at Hyrum, at which all the views of the
various parties to the high school con-
troversy will be aired. The decision rests
with the county school board, and as the
member from near Wellsville is the only
one opposed to the plan, Professor Hall
holds the belief that the protest of that
town will avail nothing unless the dele-
gation succeeds in convincing the other
representatives at the meeting that tak-
ing away the Wellsville high school would
work an injustice.
Another phase of the Cache county
problem is the desire of Logan to get into
the race, owing to the recent action of the
agricultural college in eliminating high
schools work a great degree, and also
because of the proposed action of the
Brigham Young college in eliminating
high school work, especially for the first
two years. The centralization problem
has been made more confusing to some
interested by Logan throwing its hat into
the ring and attempting to have all the
county high schools centralized into one
big institution at Logan. Heretofore
Logan has never had a high school, all high
school students having attended either
the Utah agricultural college or the Brigh-
am Young college preparatory schools.
Logan has no chance at the county

high school because it is a city of the
second class and it would require a con-
stitutional amendment to permit organiza-
tion of such a school there, as stated by
Professor Hall. He says Logan will, if
it wants a high school, have to organize
a city high school of its own and stay out
of county school politics. In discussing
the organization of the two schools—Hy-
rum and Richmond—Professor Hall said:
The making of five high schools
into two will be of vast benefit. It
will mean only half the total num-
ber of teachers and at better salar-
ies than at present; better experi-
ment and other equipment, including
the libraries, an important asset to a
school; and a general increase in
school spirit, attendance and effi-
ciency. There is already an excel-
lent new school building at Rich-
mond, which will be entirely adequate
for the proposed consolidated high
school. Hyrum will have to put up
with several makeshift buildings for a
while, but the county authorities will
immediately erect a new structure in
the event the consolidation is made.
Professor Hall returned from
an inspection trip to Moroni, Nephi and
Levan. He reports conditions good in
those three schools.

**KING ROAD GRADER
RECEIVED BY CITY**

A giant King road grader, modern in
every respect, was received by the city
street department yesterday and assem-
bled for work on the unpaved streets.
Richard P. Morris, street commissioner,
and W. J. Tuddenham, road supervisor,
went out to Sixth East street during
the day to inspect the new machine while
in action.
According to the supervisor, the new
grader will greatly facilitate the work of
his department.
An order has been placed by the city
purchasing agent for a twelve-ton steam
road roller and a twenty-five-horsepower
traction engine, both of which will be
received by the street department within
the next few weeks. This equipment was
authorized in the street department
budget.

Birth Record Broken.
All local records for births in a single
week were broken last week. The total
of 87 was reported to the health de-
partment. The previous record was 76.
Of the births, 48 were boys and 39 were
girls. Deaths totaled 10. Of these,
13 were male and 10 females. A total of
71 cases of contagious and infectious dis-
eases were reported, as follows: Scarlet
fever, 7; diphtheria, 1; typhoid fever, 1;
scarlet fever, 4; measles, 40; whooping
cough, 10; chickenpox, 8.
