

SYNOUD SESSION OPEN

Fifty-second Annual Meeting of Presbyterian Ministers.

MANY DELEGATES ARE HERE

Visitors Will Call on the President Tomorrow, and Elaborate Programmes for Both Business and Entertainment Have Been Prepared—More Coming To-day.

The annual meeting of the Fifty-second Synod of Baltimore was begun in the Gunton-Temple Memorial Church last night at 8 o'clock, with 110 delegates in attendance. The synod is made up of all the Presbyterian ministers of Maryland, Delaware, Virginia, and the District of Columbia. An extensive programme has been prepared for the entertainment of the visiting delegates, many of whom will not reach Washington until this morning.

The opening prayer was spoken by Rev. W. C. Alexander, who invoked a blessing on the work of the synod and its members. The sermon was delivered by Francis H. Moore, of Middletown, Del., the retiring moderator, who chose for his text: "If it were not so, I would not have told you so," St. John. The speaker pictured Christ as the embodiment of truth, and dwelt on His constant contradiction of false ideas, because He was truth.

A hymn was sung after the sermon, in which the congregation joined, supplemented by the Memorial choir. The roll call by Dr. Miller showed a number of delegates absent, whose arrival is expected to-morrow.

Dr. Smith Is Moderator.

The election of moderator was the chief business of last night's meeting. Dr. C. Alvin Smith, of the Western Church, of this city, was unanimously elected to this office. He was nominated by Dr. Hamilton in a laudatory speech, in which he spoke of Dr. Smith's seniority and ability, and considered it a fitting tribute to his labor in the previous synods.

The office of permanent clerk, who continues his duties for three years, fell to James M. Nourse, and that of temporary clerk to David D. Neely, both of Washington. Dr. John Lee Allison, pastor of the Gunton-Temple Church, made a happy speech, welcoming the visitors and informing them of the arrangements that have been made for their entertainment. The closing invocation was made by Rev. Dr. Hamilton, who prayed for the success of the meeting, in a larger and more efficient patrol. The following churches were represented: The Broadway Central, North Minister, Ridgely, and Second churches, of Baltimore; the Eastern, First, Fourth, Gunton-Temple, Metropolitan, New York Avenue, Northminster, Washington, Western, and Wesley churches, of Washington; and the churches of Gainswoman, Bethel, Green Hill, St. George, West Northington, Rodney, Falls Church, and Vienna.

The delegates will visit the President at the White House at 2:30 on Wednesday. Mr. Allison, who made the arrangements for this visit, announced that a luncheon would be served by the ladies of the congregation in the Gunton-Temple chapel at 12:30.

TREASURY CORRIDORS LIGHTED

Incandescent Lamps Illuminate Formerly Gloomy Halls. Employees of regular visitors to the Treasury Department noticed a vast change for the better in the interior of the Treasury building yesterday. For the first time there was put into use a new system of lighting, similar to the one at the Capitol, and the long corridors, heretofore as dark as some subterranean passage of medieval times, are now as bright as day.

At the point where the main corridor intersects the two others, large frosted globes with incandescent lamps within, were placed. Although there are but four lamps to each corridor, they are placed at such angle that the rays of light, striking the glistening walls, are refracted and reflected in such a manner that the corridors are as bright as day.

Wants an Early Hearing.

Solicitor General Hoyt, on behalf of the government, yesterday asked the Supreme Court to advance for an early hearing the appeal of the Union Bridge Company, of Pittsburgh, from the judgment of the United States Court for the Western district of Pennsylvania, imposing a fine of \$5,000 upon the bridge company for refusing to carry out the orders of the War Department, and raise the height of its bridge so that it would not be an obstruction to the navigation of Pittsburgh.

Pointed to Supply Alcohol.

The Agricultural Department is expecting great things from experiments which are being conducted in the arctic zone by Prof. Hanson, of the South Dakota experiment station. A letter, just received, tells of the cultivation of potatoes that is believed to be the first in the arctic zone. The potatoes in question are big, and so full of starch that it is said one acre of them will make more alcohol than three or four acres of almost any other sort of thing that grows.

The obsequies of the Rev. J. Hollahan, S. J., were held yesterday morning in the Dalgren Chapel, Georgetown University. Rev. David Williamson, Esq., S. J., was the celebrant of the solemn requiem mass, at which the community and many friends of the deceased were in attendance. At 1:30 the body of the dead was sung, and the mass was said just after these ceremonies. The body was followed to the college cemetery by the college faculty and student body. Brothers of the Society of Jesus were pallbearers.

New Zealand Postage.

Postmaster General Corty announced last night that on and after November 1 letters originating in New Zealand and prepaid by postage stamps at the rate of 1 penny or 2 cents for each half ounce will be delivered to addresses in the United States without charge, or the collection of additional postage.

Mitchell, of Chicago, indicated that a large number of Phi and visiting ladies from that city would be in attendance. John Joy Edson, Jr., reviewed the financial accounts, stating his committee had met with pleasing success. The arrangements for the banquet were submitted by Ralph P. Barnard, and other committee chairmen reported on the work thus far accomplished.

RAINER PARK POPULAR.

Supervisors' Report Shows Increased Attendance.

George P. Allen, forest supervisor in charge of Mount Rainier National Park, in the State of Washington, has submitted to the Secretary of the Interior an interesting report upon the conditions and management of the reservation for the fiscal year ended June 30 of the present year. Mr. Allen states that tourists travel has increased to such an extent that the two hotels in operation within the limits of the park did not afford adequate accommodation for those seeking recreation and pleasure. Twenty-five persons were given permits during the year to prospect within the reservation, none of whom were professional miners or prospectors.

TO STEM SOCIALISM.

Father Stafford Says President Looks to the Church. Rev. Dr. D. J. Stafford, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, returned to Washington yesterday from Philadelphia, where he officiated on Sunday at the dedication of a new pupil in Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church, of that city. In the course of his sermon in Philadelphia, Father Stafford said that President Roosevelt had told him in conversation that he looked to the Catholic Church, more than to any other agency, to stem the tide of socialism that seemed to be sweeping over the country.

Wants Marriage Annulled.

Katie B. Crumlin, through her father, George W. Chandler, yesterday filed suit in the District Supreme Court to annul her marriage, which was contracted in Rockville, Md., September 14 last, by the Rev. Father McGuire, with G. Crumlin. She alleges she was only fourteen years old at the time, and that she married without the consent of her parents; that the marriage was procured by force and fraud, and that she lived with her husband for six months after her marriage, being held under duress and force by her husband. She asks the court to pass a decree annulling, declaring void, and setting aside her marriage. She also desires that she may be allowed to resume her maiden name.
