DUNLOP TO HAVE A STABLE.

Billy Garth Will Purchase String for Virginia Millionaire.

William Garth, of Charlottesville, widely known as a successful trainer of race horses, has been engaged by David Dunlop, of Virginia, to purchase a string of thoroughbreds, and the millionaire will go in for racing on a larger scale than he ever before attempted. Mr. Dunlop has placed \$50,000 at Mr. Garth's disposal. The trainer is to use his own judgment as to the expenditure of any or all of the large sum.

Mr. Dunlop's curts blanché came as a great surprise to Mr. Garth and the local horse colony. Mr. Dunlop had not hinted that he contemplated going into racing on such an extensive scale. He is one of the wealthiest young men in Virginia, his income from stock in the American Tobacco Company, which took over the big Dunlop factories, being sufficient for him to indulge his tastes for racing or any other sport he may fancy.

ORACULUM STOPPING AT END

George Odum's Youngster Lasts Just Long Enough to Beat Killdeer After Setting Pace to the Stretch, Where Frank Gill Took Lead and Won on the Bit—Momentum Runs Bad Race.

JUMP NECK AND NECK

Dion Kerr Beats F. A. Clark in Brilliant Contest.

LIEUT. MARTIN'S CAVALRY CUP

United States Army Officer Leads Allegiance a Winner Over Westown, with Mr. Nicholas Up-Follow On, Pete Dailey, Palm, and Orifamme Repeat—Game Cock Loses.

Virginians won four races yesterday at Bowling, as they did on last Thursday, and brought to the meeting of the United Hunt's Racing Association, thus bringing to this section a large share of the honors of the cross-country meeting.

Courtland H. Smith, of the Cameron Run Hunt, again was in the fore with two winners among the Old Dominion contingent, and Dion Kerr, of the Warrenton Hunt, and William Garth, of Albemarle County, each captured an event. The Green Spring Steeplechase was won by Mr. Smith's Hampton Stable's Palm, and Pete Dailey again won the last race on the card, making three victories for the stout son of Longstreet. Billy Garth's Northville carried the colors in front in the Calverton Steeplechase, and Dion Kerr's clever little mare, Follow On, beat Pure Pepper in the Cameron Run Amateur Steeplechase. This race was splendidly contested all the way. Mr. F. Amherst Clark was on Pure Pepper, and the two horses took every jump in the two-mile journey neck and neck. Follow On finishing a tired winner by less than a length.

Mr. Smith's Woolgatherer was a candidate for the Cameron Run, but he got enough "chasing last week" and was withdrawn. Maple Leaf and Gypsole also declining on the same account. An odd feature of the day's sport was the victory of the Warrenton horse Follow On in the Cameron and the Cameron Run Hunt's Pete Dailey in the Warrenton Hunt hat.

Lieut. Martin's Victory.

The military race was run again with two starters, four of the six entries being withdrawn owing to the lack of eligible riders. Mr. Formant, who was injured on Saturday, of course, was unable to take the mount on the Virginia, and the association was unable to get riders from either Fort Myer or New York to pilot the others.

Lieut. Martin, of the Fifteenth Cavalry, who endeavored twice to win the Grand Military Steeplechase, without success, was rewarded for his keen interest in the sport by winning the renewal of the event yesterday with Mrs. C. V. Tupper's Allegiance, who won as he pleased from Westown. There were a number of Squadrons, Maryland National Guard. The weather conditions were admirable and the course was at its best.

Nutellus Outraces Game Cock.

The largest field called to the post was that in the Hunt Cup Steeplechase, a handicap for hunters qualified under the rules of the National Steeplechase and Hunt Association. There were seven starters, but six Grace fell and Duke of Grasslands bolted. The Duke and Nutellus cut out the running together for half a mile, and at the first turn of the field, Bates had the Duke in front by three lengths, with Nutellus leading the others by twenty or more lengths. The favorite, Game Cock, was tated along by Nat Ray, but the son of Black Cock did not fence as cleverly as most of his company. The weight was made up by a handicap for him in the final run, and Nutellus, with four pounds less in the saddle, maintained the advantage he gained early in the race. After Duke of Grasslands dropped out of it, Otho Vaughn closed up a big gap, and in passing the stand the second time Nutellus, Otho Vaughn, and Game Cock were running side by side. The lengths apart, Nutellus, however, had the most foot, and ran away from his company over the last two obstacles and on the flat. Ten lengths separated each of the placed horses, Otho Vaughn giving way to Game Cock in the stretch.

The victory of Allegiance over Westown in the Cavalry Cup was merely a gallop for Lieut. Martin's mount after they left the post. Both horses fenced beautifully, but Mr. Martin had to go to the wire several times in the first mile to get Allegiance going. However, after he got into his stride, Allegiance outran Westown every inch of the mile, and centered past the judges with Westown thirty lengths back.

Pete Dailey Wins Again. Pete Dailey's victories on Thursday and Saturday were so impressive that it was made a prohibitive favorite in the last race, the Warrenton Hunt. The only one who figured to have a chance with Mr. Smith's gelding was Mr. Clark's Maximilian. The latter made most of the early running, but Pete Dailey was at ways well. Mr. Smith taking him into an easy lead in the middle of the backstretch the second time, and holding it to the end. Mr. Devereaux kept Mount Henry far out of it until the last three furlongs, or he might have given the winner an argument; as it was, he raced over easily, and Pete Dailey in the stretch.

Mr. Mabee annexed the Maryland Selling Plate, which was the opening event, with John Duffy's Orifamme. Philander permitted to make the early pace, but Orifamme took command in the run in and won handily. Dion Kerr brought up Saurist under the whip and managed to beat The Buck for the place. Foxy, 10 to 1, was beaten by Saurist.
