TECH DEFEATED COMMERCE Get Revenge from New Yorkers for Last Year's Defeat. Thrill Makes a Touchdown, and Mess Boots a Drop Kick Over Bars for Locals' 9 Points.

William Shields' Holscher won the Dixie Stake yesterday, which was the feature of the Benning programme. The son of Lamplighter won so handsily that he undoubtedly will be reckoned with in the Maximum Stake, which will be run on Saturday. Holscher won the Brighton Cup this season, at two and a half miles, and after this victory Mr. Shields decided to keep him in training for the distance races at Benning. Yesterday was Holscher's trial for the Maximum, and he raced so impressively over the mile-and-three-quarter route that his chances for the next engagement are excellent. Holscher is entered for the Washington Cup, which is to be run this afternoon, but it is not likely that he will start.

Among the eight that faced Starter Dade Colloquy was a starter. The Western filly was a 4-to-1 choice, while Sir Toddington was an odds-on favorite.

CORNELL RUNNERS WIN. Pennsylvania Second in Intercollegiate Cross-country Run. Princeton, N. J., Nov. 28.—The intercollegiate cross-country meet here today was won by Cornell, with the University of Pennsylvania a close second. The winner of the individual championship was L. P. Jones, of Pennsylvania, who ran the distance in 35 minutes 23.5 seconds. The race was started with all the runners getting off well together. When the teams turned into the second lap of the course, Elsel, of Princeton, was well in the lead, with Jones, of Pennsylvania, second, and Colpitts, of Cornell, third. About a mile from the finish Elsel was taken sick, which practically left the race between Jones and Colpitts. Colpitts had passed Jones, but when they turned in the home stretch the Pennsylvania runner, by a splendid spurt, passed the Cornell man and finished one-fifth of a second ahead of him.

MIDDIES PLAY THE SCRUBS. Men Come Out of Hard Practice in Good Shape. Annapolis, Md., Nov. 28.—Every regular navy player was in the line-up against the scrubs this afternoon, and the critical period was passed without any injuries being received. This put the coaches and Trainer McManis in good spirits, as it insures the regular line-up for the game against the army on Saturday. MACKEY WINS MATCH. Bart Could Not Throw Washington in Handicap Bout. Rob Roy Mackey, of Washington, champion welter-weight wrestler of the South, stood off Fred Bart, of Lima, Ohio, water-champion of Canada, for an hour last night at the Washington Light Infantry Armory. They were to have wrestled to a finish, best two in three falls, at 147 pounds, but when it was found that Bart was slightly over-weight the match was made a handicap. Bart proved to be unusually fast in getting behind his man. In fact, he is one of the fastest men in that respect ever seen in Washington, but after he reached the position of advantage he was shy on what to do next. He relied mostly on crochets, holds of one variety or another, but Mackey was entirely too clever to be caught by these, and easily broke away. The nearest approach to a fall was in the last five minutes, when Mackey was forced to a high bridge, from which he escaped, largely because Bart did not know how to keep his hold after the hour had expired and Referee O'Connor had given the decision to Mackey on the handicap conditions. Bart offered to make 15 pounds and meet Mackey for a side bet of \$50. Mackey will probably meet Bart again in Ohio in about a month.
