REBO WAS UNPLACED Eastern Horse Is Beaten by Beecher at New Orleans. FAVORITE BACKED UP AT END Burlew and O'Neill Stable Hard Hit When Their Choice Failed to Win. James Reddick Won the Mile and Twenty Yards Event—Public Gets Hardest Jolt of the Meeting.

New Orleans, Nov. 30.—The public received the hardest jolt of the meeting at the Fair Ground to-day, when Rebo, the 2 to 5 favorite, was unplaced in the mile selling event, third on the card. On the strength of the recent successes of the Burlew and O'Neill combination, the layers took no liberties with Rebo to-day and made him an odds-on choice.

The stable rider, J. Hennessy, had the mount, but he was of no help when Rebo began to back up in the final quarter. The Eastern horse led for the first three-quarters by a comfortable margin, but stopped to a walk after getting straightened away for the finish. The winner turned up in Beecher, one of the outsiders who was as good as 8 to 1.
