

BENNING RACES END

Curtain Falls on Last Day of Eastern Turf Season.

HOLSCHER WINS THE FEATURE

Shields' Three-year-old Colt Scores an Impressive Victory in the Maximum, at Three Miles—Oleroso, a Beaten Favorite, in Steeplechase. Cederstrom Falls to Win Sixth.

When Luretta flashed by the judges in the sixth race at Benning it marked the close of the 1906 racing season under the jurisdiction of the Jockey Club. The meeting just closed was the most successful held by the Washington Jockey Club, but considering the change in the betting system, which made playing the races more of a task than heretofore, the attendance every day was surprisingly good. Benning had few days of bad weather. Perhaps it was more disagreeable yesterday than any of the previous days, for a gale swept over the course from the northwest and blew the sand and dust into the faces of the spectators. The crowd on Saturday was large, and the betting fraternity was eager to get even on the meeting or get something back that they had lost, while others who showed a profit wanted to get more of the bookies' coin. There is a wild scramble on the last day, and yesterday was no exception.

The most interesting race of the afternoon was the Maximum, at three miles. Benning is the only track in the East that has such a long race on the flat, and it has proved a distinct feature of the last day since it was inaugurated.

Holscher Won Handily.

William Shields' three-year-old colt Holscher won the event with just as much ease as he did his previous two victories at Benning. When Holscher was a two-year-old, "Diamond Jim" Brady had Holscher in his string, but trainer Matt Allen never was able to get a winning race out of him. After racing half of this season, Holscher was still a maiden, and Brady decided to sell the horse. Will Shields gave Brady \$1,000 for the son of Lamplighter, and after training him carefully, Holscher won a maiden race at the fall meeting of the Brighton Beach Association. He showed remarkable improvement under Shields, and was entered for the Brighton Cup, at two and a quarter miles. Holscher won this race so impressively that Mr. Shields decided to keep him in training for the three longest races on the track. Holscher was brought here, and in his work showed that he liked the Benning going. He won the Dixie, on Wednesday, at a mile and a quarter, and came back on Thanksgiving Day and captured the Washington Cup event, at two miles and a quarter. Holscher came out of these races in good shape, and yesterday he was sent after the Maximum, at three miles. Holscher's chances were always highly regarded, and the highest price ever offered was 1 to 2. Banker was next in favor, and was selected to get the place. Although Oleroso was coupled with Holscher in the straight betting, he was laid at 4 to 1 for the place.

The good steeplechaser, Sandalwood, with W. Doyle up, made the running until the party was going around the far turn the last time. Palette was lengths in front of Reindore, who opened a wide gap on Pete Dalley, Banker and Holscher. Horner rated Holscher along at a slow pace, until it was time to go after the leaders. In going through the back stretch the last time Horner gave the Steeds horse his head, and he had every one beaten but Holscher, who was straightened out for the final run.

Luretta Beats Oxford.

The defeat of Oxford in the last race was something of a surprise. Oxford had won three races at this meeting, and outclassed everything he met. He was considered to be in splendid form, and a victory in every start was generally conceded to him. Yesterday he was given 13 pounds to carry at a mile and a sixteenth. Miller raced him in front nearly all the way, but Oxford tossed it up in the last sixteenth and Luretta came from the rear division and ran over half a dozen of the leaders, getting up in time to beat both Kercheval and Oxford. Cederstrom started in this race after winning the opening one on the card in windy fashion, but the effort was too much for the Ben Strome colt, and he pulled up bleeding in the last race.

Courtland H. Smith's Oleroso was a beaten favorite in the steeplechase. Capt. Hayes, the second choice, galloping home fifteen lengths in front of Cherry Fighter. Valley Forge looked like the most probable winner, for he had plenty of foot and was three lengths to the good when taking the last jump. Here, however, Jockey Pyle went over Valley Forge's head and left the race open to Capt. Hayes. The favorite, Oleroso, could not get up any speed, and was beaten all the way.

Lady Karma, with Miller up, won the third race. She was the Chicago favorite all through the five furlongs, and was going away at the finish. Fintal was the favorite for the fifth race, with Marster next in public estimation. These two went to the front, and outdistanced their company. Fintal beat Marster by four lengths, and Marster had a gap of six lengths between him and Marksman.

Hockey at Cornell Starts Up Again.

The Cornell athletic council has authorized the organization of a hockey team at the institution for the coming season. It is two years since there was a team at Cornell. This team played and won two games, one at Syracuse and the other at Rochester, and then was disbanded by the faculty because of mismanagement. Of the men who played then the following now are in college: W. B. Ricketson, '99, captain; H. P. Reber, '98, forward; and R. R. Lally, '98, forward. They will come out to play again.

Nebraska After Cross-country Cup.

The Western Intercollegiate Cross-Country Association cup will be the special aim of the Nebraska runners. By the terms of the gift it has to be won three times to be the permanent possession of any one college. Nebraska won it in 1904 and 1906, Chicago in 1905, so that the Nebraskans are keen for the third victory and the cup. The record for the five-mile Chicago course over which the race is run is 25 minutes 17.2 seconds, by James D. Lightbody, of the University of Chicago, in 1905.

Asphyxiated in His Auto.

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 1.—Gustav Loeding, fifty-eight years old, well-known as a promoter of amusement enterprises, was found dead in his automobile in a garage at 1243 Somerset street last night, having been asphyxiated by gasoline fumes while leaning over the tank of the machine making repairs. Loeding had been dead 60 hours when his body was discovered.

BURNS' BLOWS HURT O'BRIEN.

Philadelphia Jack Laid Up, with Physician in Attendance.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 1.—That Jack O'Brien was more seriously hurt in his contest with Tommy Burns on Wednesday than was at first supposed was generally realized yesterday when Philadelphia Jack did not put in an appearance at Manager McCarey's office to receive his share of the purse. Instead, he is still prostrated from the effects of the fight. His mother and sister are at his bedside, and a physician is constantly in attendance. Although both O'Brien and Burns were pronounced in perfect physical condition by the club physician, it is no secret here among those who have studied the Quaker City boxer that he has some latent organic weakness.

Burns had been told to pummel O'Brien about the body. He did so repeatedly in the clinches. The spectators close to the ringside could see the Quaker City heavyweight wince every time he was punched over the kidneys or under the heart. Burns did not hit him hard enough in the mouth to make his lips bleed, and when O'Brien began to spit blood those around the ringside began to realize the effect of Burns' body blows.

While the Philadelphia's condition is not serious, yet it is such as to warrant the constant attendance of a physician. His family fears hemorrhages, as lung trouble is its hereditary ailment.
