

LIFE-SAVERS BUSY

Supt. Kimball Makes Annual Report on Service.

RESPOND TO MANY CALLS

During Past Year, Out of 4,099 Persons in Shipwrecks, Only 19 Were Lost, is the Good Work of the Men in the Department—Much Property Salvaged—Many Vessels Assisted.

S. I. Kimball, general superintendent of the lifesaving service, in his annual report, submitted to the Secretary of the Treasury yesterday, says that during the fiscal year ended July 31 last, 357 documented vessels met with disaster.

On board these vessels were 4,099 persons, 19 of whom lost their lives. The estimated value of the vessels was \$10,187,545, and of their cargoes, \$4,548,965, making the total value of the property imperiled \$14,736,510. Of this amount \$11,972,280 was saved through the efforts of the lifesaving service, and only \$2,764,230 lost.

The estimated value of property in these cases was \$304,750, of which, approximately, \$253,820 was saved, and \$50,930 lost. During the year 1,727 days' relief was furnished to 811 shipwrecked persons, and necessary articles of clothing were supplied to 292 persons.

Assisted Many Vessels. The lifesaving crews, the report adds, also assisted 37 other vessels, making the total to which aid was extended 1,245. In addition to this, 97 steamers and 77 sailing vessels were discovered and running into danger and were warned by the patrolmen and station lookouts of the service, and thereby saved from possible disaster.

The report contains a tabulated statement of the operations of the service since its establishment in 1871 up to the end of the fiscal year. It shows that the total number of disasters reached 16,715, and the total number of persons involved 116,442. The number of lives lost was 1,127. The total value of the vessels involved was \$1,117,324. The total value of cargoes involved was \$11,727,824. The total value of property saved was \$12,062,612, and of property lost was \$2,764,230.

Notable progress was made, the report says, in equipping the stations with power lifeboats. During the last year seven of the largest size lifeboats were equipped with gasoline engines, and one new power boat constructed. These boats, Mr. Kimball says, will increase the radius of effective action of lifesaving stations, as they enable the crews to cover a greater distance more speedily, and allow their full strength to be applied to the rescue of a wrecked vessel, whereas with the old style of rowboat of the lifesavers were often completely exhausted by their efforts to reach the wreck.
