Seufert Says First Thought Was of His "Widow."

LIVES THROUGH TWO DEATHS

Sees Flames Steadily Approaching Him, Then as Water Pours into His Prison Fears End by Drowning. Graphically Describes His Thirty-one Hours Entombment.

New York, Jan. 8.—Mrs. John Seufert, the wife of fireman John Seufert, of Engine Company 22, said of the side of her husband's Hudson Street hospital this morning and heard him tell her how near he had been to death during the thirty-one hours that he had been buried beneath tons of debris in the ruined paper warehouse of George J. Hills, at 54 Roosevelt street.

KAISER ADDRESSES DIET

Urges Carrying Out of Historical Task in Polish Germany.

Berlin, Jan. 8.—Chancellor von Buelow read the speech of the Emperor King at the opening of the Prussian Diet to-day. After referring to the excellent financial condition of Prussia the speech announced the government's intention to propose fresh legislation to meet the difficulties encountered in Poland "in carrying out the historical task of strengthening the German elements there."

REPUBLICAN TICKET DEFATED

OWEGO, N. Y., Jan. 8.—The citizens ran a ticket at charter election to-day and defeated the Republicans, hands down, the majority being from 15 to 24. This is the first ticket in opposition to the Republicans in this village in many years.

Girl Fights Off Footpad

Chester, Pa., Jan. 8.—While returning to her home late last night, Alice Boyce, a waitress in a restaurant, was attacked by a man who followed her to within a short distance of her home. There he grabbed her and attempted to place a knife in her mouth. Miss Boyce fought off the man and sought refuge on the porch of a neighbor's house. The police were notified and later a man answering the description given by Miss Boyce was arrested. Miss Boyce, however, was unable to identify him, and he was discharged.

Congressmen Say Panama Is Healthy Enough for American Labor.

Attorney General Jackson Makes Sensational Raid.

New York, Jan. 8.—United States Senator Flint, of California; Representatives McKinley and Knowlands, of the same State; Representatives Fulkerson of Missouri; DeLoach, of Kentucky; McKinley, and Smith, of Illinois; Howell, of Utah; Kincaid, of Nebraska, and Steenerson, of Minnesota, who sailed from here for Colon on December 21 to investigate the Panama Canal at their own expense, returned here to-day on the steamer Panama, very much pleased at what they had seen, and for the most part gratified at the work that had been done and of the future prospects.

SEEK MOTIVE FOR DEATH

Police Unable to Explain Finding of Dr. Johnson's Body.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 8.—Mystery so deep it seemed it might never be solved to-day surrounded the shocking death of a former New Yorker of well-known connections, Dr. Philip Edwards Johnson, son of Archdeacon Johnson, of Staten Island. Dr. Johnson, whose wife was Mrs. Laura Scarborough, of New York, and a daughter of former Gov. Hoadley, of Ohio, was found dead in Jefferson street immediately below the Ford street bridge, whence, alive or dead, he evidently had fallen 117 feet.

WILL RESTORE OLD MONUMENT

Boonshoro Citizen to Rebuild First Shaft to Washington.

Hagerstown, Md., Jan. 8.—The Society for the Restoration and Preservation of the First Monument to George Washington was formally organized at a largely attended meeting of representative citizens of the county at Boonshoro yesterday afternoon. It is the purpose of the society to make a systematic effort to have the United States government take the matter in hand and place the old monument and its surroundings in suitable condition.
