A higher rate than this could be obtained at home, but it was explained that the bank had intended to purchase gold for import, and that the change of purpose indicated a feeling of confidence.

AUTOMOBILE AS PRISON VAN

Special to The Washington Herald. Baltimore, Md., Feb. 13.—The Johns Hopkins freshmen raided the juniors to-night while the juniors were assembling for their class banquet, but failed to capture any of the juniors and retreated.

Then the juniors got together and raided the freshmen for a class banquet at the Club Hotel for a class banquet. The juniors carried seven of the freshmen into their banquet hall at the New Howard Hotel and tied the freshmen to chairs while the juniors feasted in victory.

After the juniors had finished their repast they released the hungry freshmen. By this time the freshmen's supper was over.

Hostilities Begun.

Yesterday marked the first open hostilities between the belligerent classes, when punishment was meted out to several "freshies" who dared to kidnap a member of the junior class.

This aroused the juniors, and they swore to spend the rest of the day, regardless of all classes and university duties, in capturing all the freshmen they can find. Before noon about twenty of the most important members of the lower class had been bound and carried out into the country in an automobile belonging to one of the juniors, where they have been confined, anywhere they will be kept for some days.

Freshmen Felled.

Last night a band of conspirators from the freshman class attempted to capture the junior toastmaster in his own vestibule. The party went up to the toastmaster's home about 9 o'clock last night and asked for the pleasure of his company for a few days, but so far from being courteous enough to grant the desire of his visitors, the cruel junior called forth the group of his classmates who were within the house.
