

HEARST IS AT WORK

His Political Agents Busy in Middle West.

BRYAN MOVEMENT IS GROWING

Nebraska's Friends Are Convinced He Can Be Elected—Republicans Fear This View Is Right—Bryans in New England Organizing, Democrats Afraid of Taft.

William Randolph Hearst is organizing to make his influence felt at the next Democratic national convention. Organizers for the Independence League are already at work in Iowa, Indiana, and other of the Central Western States. Mr. Hearst is believed to be attempting to force recognition from the nominee of the convention, who, presumably, will be William J. Bryan. But just what it is Mr. Hearst is after, nobody pretends to know, for nobody ever knows what Mr. Hearst is trying to do.

Despite the assurance which has come from all those who have talked with Mr. Bryan at Lincoln recently that his heart is not set on the Presidential nomination, his friends are showing an activity which is greater than any other now being manifested in the Democratic ranks. These friends say that, no matter what views their leader may entertain, they are convinced he can be elected President, and they are not going to take any chances on the nominating convention.

Uninstructed Delegations. The movement differs somewhat from different sections of the country. The best organization is that for the New England States. It is proposed to send an uninstructed delegation from each of these States, but the organization which is engineering the movement is composed exclusively of men whose personal loyalty to Bryan the leader himself will vouch for. Each of the New England States has its own organization, with a central organization for New England, to which it reports, and the promise is made that only Bryan men will go to the convention from any of these States, and that they will not be instructed, but will hold themselves in readiness to support any other candidate who will carry out the policies for which Mr. Bryan stands, if, for any reason, the nomination of the Nebraskan is undesirable.

Mr. Bryan himself, it is said, may conclude that he does not desire the nomination, and in that event all the New England delegates will be prepared to rush for the man on whom the Bryan mantle will fall. Not less than sixteen States, including New York, New Jersey, Illinois, and Indiana, have either directly endorsed the candidacy of Mr. Bryan, or adopted resolutions complimentary and congratulating him.

Democrats Not Comforted. It is one of the most remarkable developments in recent politics that, aside from the pronounced Bryan supporters, Democratic leaders are not entertained a hopeful view of the fight for 1908. None of them views the situation as entirely hopeless, but the party has been defeated so badly and so frequently of late that its members seem to lack political courage.

The Republicans, on the other hand, view the campaign of 1908 with alarm. They regard New York as decidedly uncertain, no matter who may be the Republican nominee. They believe that even Mr. Roosevelt himself would find it difficult to carry that State. Other States which certainly would be found in the Republican column with Roosevelt as the nominee are placed in the doubtful list should a candidate of corporation tendencies be chosen. By corporation tendencies is not necessarily meant a candidate with corporation connections, but one who recently has been forced into a support of the administration. Such a nominee, a large part of the Republican membership of the House believes, would mean an uncertain result in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, and even in Iowa and Kansas.

Taft Feared by Democrats. Next to Roosevelt, the man whom the Democrats fear as a candidate above all others is Secretary Taft. Taft, too, is regarded by the Republicans on the House side as their most available candidate, the President's well-known position being kept in mind. The hostility to the Secretary in the Senate, however, is just as intense as it is to Roosevelt. Perhaps the indication in a recent vote, but the disinterested view in Washington is that a very considerable number of Republican Senators would prefer to see Bryan elected rather than have four years more of administration by a "Roosevelt Republican." A day does not pass but one hears the remark that if a Democrat were in the White House a Republican Senate could block him without calling down upon itself the wrath of the party.

The Senators whose tenure of office seems secure are on an entirely different basis from the Representatives, who must go up or down with their Presidential candidate. The recent elections by the legislatures of the various States give the interests which have always looked to the Senate for help almost an absolute guarantee of protection. Nothing short of a political revolution could change the Senate's sentiment. Even if there should be a clean sweep in the States, it would not give that party control of the Upper Body, and with this guarantee of security "the interests" can afford to take chances on the annihilation of Rooseveltism in the Republican party.

Republican politicians have a keener appreciation than have the Democrats of Bryan's running qualities. In the States which are safely Democratic, Mr. Bryan is not nearly as strong as in the States where Republicans are in control. The South is not, and never has been, enamored of Bryan, but his popularity in Indiana and Ohio apparently is greater now than at any other time in his career, and the same sentiment would apply to New York, Connecticut, and New Jersey.

Popular in Middle West. A prominent citizen of Columbus, Ohio, now in Washington, was discussing the hold of Mr. Bryan on the people of his State with a group of Republican politicians. On February 20 the Columbus Board of Trade is to give its annual banquet. Ordinarily not more than two or three hundred people are assembled on that occasion. The membership of the club is 1,100, representing every important business interest of the city. This year Mr. Bryan was invited to deliver the chief address, and was asked to talk in a non-political way on his travels abroad, with their application to affairs in this country. Already more than 900 of the 1,100 members of the club have applied for tickets at the banquet. It was necessary to make a rule that only members of the club could secure seats, and a change had to be made from the usual banquet place to a larger one. It is significant, too, that the membership of the club is largely Republican.

Mr. Bryan's friends do not know exactly what sort of a proposition Mr. Hearst will have to submit to the convention next year, but they believe Bryan, and not Hearst, will dominate that gathering.

The shaped front panel is in one piece, and wonderfully becoming, while the side and back skirt portion is joined to it and gathered easily at the top. The latter may fasten with a button or with wide strings for tying. Percale and gingham are the favorite materials for service, though lawn and nainsook make very attractive aprons. The medium size calls for 4-4 yards of 36-inch material.
