The Tigers mixed two infield singles with a sacrifice, an out, and some fast base-running and worked round a run in their half of the opening period.

From then on through the fifth inning neither side threatened. In the sixth, however, a pass to D. Jones, Crawford's single, Cobb's double, and ball thrown by Patten and Warner led Detroit score three times, thus sealing up the game.

For good measure the Tigers took advantage of a lull in play by Patten to bat all the way round, and one man more in the eighth inning, into which they crammed singles by D. Jones, Crawford, Rossman, Schaefer, Payne, and O'Leary, which, supplemented by Altizer's boot of Coughlin's grounder, netted six runs more.

Washington made a rally in the ninth to escape the shut-out, and nearly succeeded. C. Jones and Cross batted over the railing of the big bleachers, and scooped in the little infielder's high foul, which popped.

New York, May 23.—Droves of pitchers circulated in and out of the box for the New Yorks in their game with the Chicago to-day. McGraw used all he had—six in a useless but well-meant effort to keep the Cubs from winning, and there was not time to send to the minor leagues for more.

Joe McGinity, who had not expected to put on his uniform at all, was the sixth and last pitcher summoned to the platform, and the dynasty in the order of their reign up to his advent had been Wiltsie, 1 inning; Ames, 2 innings; Mathewson, 3 of an inning; Taylor, 1-2 innings; Ferguson, 2 innings; McGinity, 1 inning.

Not all of these pitchers were disposed of because they were ineffective. Ferguson and McGinity were not hit by the Chicago. Ferguson being taken out because it was advisable that somebody bat for him. Nor did Taylor pitch badly, he was going into retirement for the same reason that Ferguson did. Wiltsie was hit freely. Ames was wild, and Mathewson was a veritable cinch for the Cub hitters.
