GEN. WILLIAMS RETIRED.

Service of Department Commander Will End to-day. Brig. Gen. Constant Williams, recently stationed at Denver, Colo., in command of the Department of Colorado, will be placed on the retired list to-day by reason of age.

He is a native of Pennsylvania, and entered the army as a private, serving during the civil war. He subsequently took part in the Indian campaigns and was distinguished at Big Hole, Mont., in August, 1877. By gradual promotion he reached the grade of brigadier general in July, 1894.
