The people of the United States are the largest users of ostrich plumes in the world. The annual importation represents more than \$2,500,000, while the annual crop produced in the United States is worth about \$100,000.

There are many farms in California where the business has proved a profitable one, and others are being established in various Southern States. The Salt River (Ariz.) ostrich farm has nearly 2,000 birds and markets over \$50,000 worth of feathers a year.

Brownsville Committee Listens to Mrs. Louis Cowen.

MOTHER SAVES CHILDREN

Describes How She Hid Five Little Ones Under Bed When Rioting Report of Army Rifle-Servant Girl Testifies Seeing Negro Soldiers Firing.

The most dramatic account of the shooting up of Brownsville yesterday presented to the Senate Committee on Military Affairs was given yesterday by Mrs. Louis Cowen, whose house was riddled with bullets by the rioters, and who probably saved the lives of her five children by hiding them under a bed as soon as the building was fired upon.

Mrs. Cowen had given a children's party that evening, and the last of the forty guests had left only a short while before midnight, when the rioting began.

She showed considerable excitement even yesterday when telling the committee of how her children were scared, when the bullets began to come through the walls, how she had taken them to one of the bedrooms, pushed them under the bed, and had then thrown herself on the floor where the bullets that passed over their heads struck the room and some of its furniture, including a large mirror.

Bullets Riddle House

Twenty-three bullets were fired into the house, most of them passing through one or more rooms and then out of the house again by the rear walls, covering everything with splinters and plaster.

Armed Martinez, Mrs. Cowen's servant girl, corroborated her story of the shooting, and told how when she had started to close the shutters of a window she had seen a negro soldier in the act of shooting into the house, and had dropped to the floor, where she remained until the firing was over.

Bernard H. Kowalski, a guest at the Cowen's children's party, told of hearing, while sitting by the open window, one negro say to another as they passed the house:

"Those people are having a nice time now, but in half an hour they won't have such nice times."

Important Changes Are Made by the Associated Charities.
