The guests included the justice's sister, Miss Brewer, of Stockbridge, Mass., who has spent the winter here with Justice Brewer's daughter, Mrs. Jemore; Mrs. Welling Wells, of Boston, youngest daughter of the justice; Mrs. Jemore, his eldest daughter, and her two little daughters, and Mr. and Mrs. James Karrick, of this city, son-in-law and second daughter of the distinguished jurist, and their two sons, David Brewer Karrick and James, Jr.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Brewer was a shower of flowers all day, more of them being sent than they had places to put them. Among the gifts, however, the one he prizes the most highly is about fifty-five letters of congratulation and good wishes from friends all over the world, including President Roosevelt, Vice President Fairbanks, the Chief Justice, and all the other members of the Supreme Court, many of the Cabinet, Congressional, and other official circles, and his old classmates at Yale of the class of 1858. These letters Mrs. Brewer had bound in a handsome leather binding, inscribed with his name and dates in gilt lettering upon the outside, making a very beautiful exterior. The letters were purely personal, written in the happiest possible vein, each in characteristic fashion.

Justice Brewer has been upon the bench of the Supreme Court of the United States since 1889, when he succeeded to the seat made vacant by the death of Associate Justice Stephen Matthews. He had the unusual distinction of serving for some years upon the same bench with his uncle, Associate Justice Stephen J. Field, who was a brother of Mr. Brewer's mother.
