## COMMENTS ON MILK

### Health Officer Urges Systematic Tests.

### MORE INSPECTORS NEEDED

### Would Try Plan of "Certified Milk" Dr. Woodward Calls Attention to Recommendations by Milk Conference Which He Says Do Not Require Specific Legislation.

Dr. W. C. Woodward, health officer of the District, yesterday submitted to the Commissioners his comments on the recent recommendations of the milk conference, in which are pointed out those recommendations that may be acted upon without further legislation, and also those which will be embodied in a bill for the improvement of the milk supply, to be submitted by the Commissioners to the next Congress.

### Inspection Force Insufficient.

The communication points out that to do such work with the inspection force now at command of the health officer would result in the general neglect of the supervision over dairy farms that it now maintains.

Dr. Woodward also recommends the adoption of a regulation providing that all receipts for milk in quantities exceeding one quart, for delivery to customers, be sealed with a leaden or sealing wax seal, in a manner satisfactory to the health officer, and kept so sealed until after delivery, except as may be necessary to open them for the purpose of official inspection.

### "Certified Milk" Dairies Wanted.

The health officer is to be authorized to advertise for dairies and dairy farms, the proprietors of which are willing to modify their barns, stables, etc., so as to procure a certificate from him showing that they are producing what is by the milk conference described as "certified milk," and the Commissioners will confer with the Medical Society of the District with reference to procuring the establishment of a laboratory under its supervision for the preparation and sale of certified milk.

The recommendation, under the caption "Dairies of Consumer," that systematic instruction with reference to the sanitary relation of milk as an article of diet, and of other foods, be made a part of the curriculum of the public schools, will be referred by the Commissioners to the board of education.

Before final action is taken by the Commissioners, the regulations as above set forth will be referred to the corporation counsel for report as to their form, and as to whether in his judgment it is within the authority of the health officer and the Commissioners to promulgate them.

### Will Submit Proposed Legislation.

The milk conference will, during the coming fall, submit to the Commissioners a draft of such legislation as the conference deems necessary to properly safeguard the milk supply of the District, and certain recommendations of the conference looking to an increase in the inspection force will be submitted to the Commissioners by the health officer in the preparation of his annual estimates to Congress.

Dr. Woodward also calls to the attention of the Commissioners certain recommendations of the conference for which Congressional action is necessary. Commissioner Macfarland said yesterday that he would recommend at once to the Commissioners that those recommendations which Dr. Woodward said could and should be made effective without waiting for further legislation, be carried out, and that the other questions be embodied in the bill to be presented by the Commissioners to Congress in December.

### SEPARATED IN A GREAT CITY

Couple from South Carolina Spends Anxious Night and Day.

Reunited When Husband Seeks Aid from Police, Who Had Been Consulted by Wife.

Raymond Groover, of Florence, S. C., and his wife were happily reunited at the Dewey Hotel last night, following a double search in which the aid of the police was solicited by each in looking for the other.

Mr. and Mrs. Groover arrived in Washington Friday night from the Jamestown Exposition, and registered at the Dewey Hotel. After seeing his wife safely delivered, Mr. Groover strolled out for a view of Washington, and, attracted by the many beauties of the Capital City, continued his walk until, upon deciding to return to the hotel, he discovered that he had lost all idea of direction or distance.

The name of the hotel had also escaped him, and thereupon began a search which lasted all night. Exhausted from his vain efforts, Mr. Groover applied at police headquarters at 8 o'clock yesterday morning for aid in locating his wife, and upon the suggestion of the detectives, went to the Mount Vernon Hotel, but was again disappointed. Later Mrs. Groover, becoming alarmed, telephoned to police headquarters a description of her missing husband, with a request that he be located.

## LITTLE HOPE FOR CASSIE.

### Mrs. Chadwick Urgently Seeking Parole from Prison.

Uncle Sam is turning a deaf ear to the frantic appeals of Cassie Chadwick, the noted adventuress, now serving out a ten years' sentence in the Columbus (Ohio) Penitentiary.

It has been decided that she is not entitled to parole, this being her second imprisonment, and she will not be transferred to a Federal prison.

The Department of Justice could not order her transfer to a Federal prison if it so desired, because those buildings have no wings for women prisoners. Although the woman has fairly driven the Ohio warden to distraction by her complaints and appeals, it is not at all likely that she will even be transferred to another State prison.

It is understood that the next storm center of the Chadwick disturbance will be Oyster Bay. Her only hope of being released from prison before November 26, 1911, rests in President Roosevelt. It is not believed the least consideration would be given to an application for commutation of imprisonment.

## DIRT FLYING ON ISTHMUS.

### Report Shows 1,058,776 Yards Excavated in July.

The Washington office of the Isthmian Canal Commission yesterday morning received a cable from the chief engineer, Col. Goethals, on the Isthmus, stating that the excavation on the canal during July was as follows:

This is the largest month's work done.

The rainfall for the month is reported at 9.5 inches, against 14 inches in June.

During the month of July, 1906, there were but 157,993 cubic yards excavated in Culebra Cut, against 770,570 cubic yards for the same month this year.

## CAPITAL FEARS RATE WARS

### Trouble of Southern May Arrest Progress in the South.

Government Officials Believe Moneyed Interests Will Refuse to Invest South of Potomac River.

The intense feeling of hostility recently manifested against the Southern Railway by the officials of North Carolina, and the echo of that conflict, which comes from Alabama, in the announcement that the license of the railroad company to do business in that State have created a feeling of grave apprehension in the minds of high government officials for the future welfare of the South.

Gov. Glenn, of North Carolina, is being held responsible for a crusade that brings trouble, if not disaster. Although the Federal authorities recognize the desirability of having just railroad rates established, they see no good that can result from the spirit of deep antagonism already apparent between State and railroad authorities.

It is feared here that if Virginia defies a Federal injunction now in force, a bitter and widespread conflict will ensue, and the result be diminished train service and the refusal of capitalists to further invest in railroad properties and extensions south of Mason and Dixon's line.
