BARKER BABY FOUND

Unaffected by Absence from Camp Good Will.

LOCATED IN DENSE THICKET

Troopers Under Capt. Preston from Fort Myer Discover Missing Child 400 Yards North of the Camp.

Rev. John Van Schaick Expresses Thanks of the Outing Committee.

Safe in his tent at Camp Good Will, unaffected by a good dinner, and not at all moved by his disappearance of forty hours, Robert Barker, who was found at noon yesterday by Fort Myer troopers, led by Capt. Guy H. Preston and Rev. John Van Schaick, spent last night in peaceful sleep.

No trace of emotion or injury was played on the boy and he rejoined his playmates yesterday afternoon with the same spontaneity that he had shown before his disappearance and he moved among them as if nothing unusual had happened.

In fact he was the most unconcerned person in the camp, for a happier and more joyful gathering could hardly have been found than those who fondled and welcomed him on his return.

Congratulations and gratitude were expressed on every side to the soldiers, the policemen, and the citizens who had joined in the search, and many tears of joy were shed by the feminine attendants at the camp and by the relatives of the boy.

Dr. Van Schaick Thankful. In the name of the summer outings committee, Rev. John Van Schaick, pastor of the Church of Our Father, and one of the most untiring searchers for the boy, made the following statement yesterday:

"I want to express the deep appreciation I feel, as a member of the summer outings committee, of the efforts of the soldiers, citizens, police, and detectives, who have stuck to this job until it was done. Thursday it was almost insufferably hot, and to-day it rained so that their efforts were at all times under discouraging conditions.

Mothers Need Not Fear. "The citizens of Washington can rest assured that we have the best camp we ever had since the work began, and that practical common sense and kindness are united in the work out there. The accident was unavoidable and unforeseen, and is not likely to occur again; so that mothers may feel perfectly assured in sending their children to Camp Good Will."

The boy was found four hundred yards north of Camp Good Will, in a dense pine thicket. Fifty wildly cheering troopers burst out of the woods, one of whom held the babe. He was Private Rice, of Company F, Thirteenth Cavalry.

Search Resumed Unabated. Early yesterday morning the police and a number of volunteers, who responded to Secretary Weller's appeal, resumed the search left off because of darkness the night before.

Successful End of Search. The hunt had continued but half an hour, when a shout was heard to the extreme right of the line, and every man rushed like mad in that direction.

HINTS FOR CUSTOMERS.

Placeards Announcing Hour of Closing to Be Hung in Saloons. Placeards calling the attention of patrons to the fact that saloons must be closed exactly at 12 o'clock midnight will within a few days be placed in the windows of the saloons by order of the excise board. This is deemed necessary, as several cases have recently been called to the attention of the board of saloons remaining open from five to twenty minutes after closing time. It is thought that with the assistance of these placeards the proprietors will be able to impress upon their customers the necessity of closing upon the minute.

A new regulation promulgated by the board is to the effect that any applicant for a liquor license whose license has been rejected will not be permitted to file an application for a license at the rejected place from a date of six months on which the previous application was rejected. This does not apply, however, to applications for renewals in rejected applications.

EXCURSIONS.

There is ozone in the air at Chesapeake Beach, and the weary dweller-in-town finds the delightful breeze that continually blows at this resort not only delightful, but invigorating. Those who have visited the beach this season have found that it is cool when no other place is, aside from the excellent bathing and fishing to be had here, there are many other amusements that make the day pass pleasantly and merrily, and with comfort. As the summer season advances the crowds are increasing in size daily, and the beach is becoming more and more a panorama of color that reminds the visitor of some fashionable resort farther up the Atlantic coast. Excellent passenger service, both daily and Sunday, have been made to maintain the popularity of Chesapeake Beach.

Marshall Hall is a place where one can go and spend the entire day away from the hot dusty city. The green lawns and well-kept walks retain their rich red and gold of the sun, as do the aquatic struts. Marshall Hall is cool and pleasant, and there are many amusements and diversions that appeal to both the old and young, and the little ones always have the best kind of a time when they are taken to spend the day there. Table d'hôte dinner is served on the arrival of the boat. Prof. Schroeder's band is always in attendance, and furnishes a select program of music every afternoon. The band will be in the Hall during the afternoon and evening. Steamer Charles Macalester will leave for Marshall Hall tomorrow at 11 a. m., 2:30, and 6:30 p. m.

The evening trips of the steamer Harry Randall, on Sunday, and of the big steamer St. Johns, on Monday, have proven very attractive this summer, and each week large throngs take advantage of the outings to enjoy a good, cool ride on the river and, incidentally, some good music on the Randall trips and dancing on the St. Johns trips. The steamer Harry Randall leaves her berth at 10:30 p. m. on Sunday evenings at 6:30 o'clock and sails down the river to below Indian Head, where she turns and comes back to Chesapeake Beach about 10:30 p. m. The feature of these trips is the concert by an orchestra, conducted by Prof. Chris Arth, leader of the National Theater orchestra.

Monday evening the St. Johns, the popular Colonial Beach excursion steamer, will leave her berth at 6:45 o'clock on a four-hour run on the Potomac. The steamer sails down to about Liverpool point, and returning reaches Chesapeake Beach at 10:30 p. m. On this trip an orchestra, stationed on the wide main deck of the big boat, will play the latest waltzes and two-step dances, and those who can have a most pleasant evening. The dancing deck is in the forward part of the steamer, and the seven bands which the steamer is carrying play the music in a most effective and light-hearted manner. The cool dining room on the St. Johns will be open on these trips, and supper will be served to those desiring it. The Randall and St. Johns will stop at Alexandria on these trips.

The week-end trips of the big and fast steamer St. Johns to Colonial Beach, the Atlantic City of Washington, affords a most excellent opportunity for a twenty-five hour trip to salt water and a chance to take several salt water baths before returning home Sunday night. The steamer St. Johns will leave her berth at 5:30 p. m. on Saturday evening, making a long trip to the beach, and after landing her passengers will return to make another trip, leaving her at 8:45 o'clock Sunday morning. These week-end excursions on the St. Johns will have several hours in which to enjoy a bath in the briny Potomac, to crabbing and fishing, or to enjoy the many other amusements that can be found at the beach. The big modern trip boat, which has just been built by the Washington and Potomac Steamboat Company, is in use. It is a big building, fitted up with the latest and best and other modern equipment for the comfort and pleasure of the bathers. These hot days of the month of August on the briny Potomac is particularly enjoyable, and those who wish to make the most of their Saturday afternoon or Sunday morning need not fear being crowded on the big steamer St. Johns. On the trip home from the beach, the steamer leaves the beach at 6 p. m., and will arrive here about 10:30 p. m. Stops will be made at Alexandria on all trips.

Enjoyable as is a visit to the Jamestown Exposition, all the pleasures of the trip are not at all if one goes by the superbly appointed Norfolk and Washington boats. These splendid machines of ship construction have every possible device and convenience that can be desired for the safety and comfort of the passengers, insuring a thoroughly delightful trip down the Potomac and Chesapeake under all conditions. Double daily service to Norfolk is maintained, steamers sailing at 8 a. m. and leaving an all-day trip to the ocean, and a regular line at 6:30 p. m., making the trip over night. Southbound, both day and evening, boats stop at the beach, and at Old Point Comfort, plus as well as southbound.

The height of the season sees no waning in the popularity of Chevy Chase Lake. Summer does this resort seem to grow in favor as the latter advances. The refined class of amusement, nature attractions, and special car service account in large measure for this state of affairs. Prominent among the attractions are the popular performances of the Marine Band musicians, who are on hand, rain or shine, rendering a splendid programme each evening. In lieu of inclement weather the concert is given at the dancing pavilion, which is strong, proof and spacious enough to accommodate a large throng. Dancing is in order after 9 and continues until 11. Facilities for hotel, and dining, etc., are splendidly provided for at Chevy Chase Lake, and there is a motion-picture theater.

HEAR PROBATIONER RABBI NEW LEGISLATION REQUIRED. Adath Israel Congregation Pleased with Eleazar Irjanski. Commissioners Experience Difficulty in Opening Minor Streets. Declare It Impossible Now to Get Jury to Find Benefits Equaling Damages and Costs.

The Adath Israel Orthodox Hebrew Congregation, having as yet been unable to select a rabbi for their synagogue, Cantor Eleazar Irjanski, a native of Alexandria, Russia, where he administered to the spiritual wants of his co-religionists, offered himself as a candidate and chanted Sabbath eve services yesterday evening.

The probationer made a favorable impression among the majority of the men of the congregation by reason mainly of his strong, clear, and musically sweet voice in which he sang the services. Cantor Irjanski will recite Sabbath services this morning at 10 o'clock. Having been a resident of this country only a little over nine months, the candidate has not yet mastered the English language, and will therefore say the prayers in Yiddish.

It is not at all improbable that Adath Israel, in addition to a regular rabbi, will also engage the services of a cantor, and those who have visited the synagogue of trustees of the congregation, Cantor Irjanski will probably be engaged in the latter capacity. The holiday season approaching, and the new synagogue being almost completed, the members of the Adath Israel congregation are very desirous of making an early choice of a spiritual leader to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Rev. Dr. Loeb, who accepted a call to Atlanta, Ga.
