September to Bring Back Many of the Leaders in Washington's Fashionable Set—Diplomats Are the Last to Return.

THE advent of September will produce a marked change in the aspect of Washington; activity will be evinced in everything animate and inanimate, for activity extends, of course, from people to the streets and shops in that the presence in the city of society people adds zest and interest to the lives of all. Labor Day, of course, will be given over to week-end and house parties, but after to-morrow each day will bring a greater influx of homecomers.

The Misses Ridgely, daughters of Comptroller of the Currency William Barrett Ridgely, in returning Thursday, were among the earliest of the smart set to arrive in Washington, and in less than a week the entire family will be reunited. Mrs. Ridgely, with her mother, Mrs. Deering, has been at Warm Springs, Va., for a number of weeks, while Misses Catherine and Eleanor Ridgely visited relatives in Virginia this summer instead of taking a more active part socially at larger and more fashionable resorts.

The families of Cabinet officers will be re-established in their homes here before another month passes, the date for the return of the Secretary of the Navy and Mrs. Metcalf having been set for September 15, or thereabouts. The Secretary of Commerce and Labor is due about the same time.

Many, of course, will linger in the hills and mountains to enjoy the golden glory of bright autumn days, when the air is crisp and frosty, and masses of brilliant-dyed foliage are scattered, with a suggestion of abandon, about the landscape, as far as the vision reaches.
