AGAIN SUES BROTHER

Lee A. Stubblefield Asks for an Accounting.

TRUST FUND INVOLVES \$14,000

Complainant Declares Relative Has Refused to Tell About Disposition of Deposit Made in 1898—Division of Firm, in Which Defendant Was Interested, Formas One of Features.

Lee A. Stubblefield yesterday filed in the District Supreme Court an additional suit against his brother, Thomas W. Stubblefield, in which he asks an accounting for a trust fund of \$14,000. Numerous charges and counter charges in relation to the handling of funds have been made in the several proceedings instituted by the Stubblefield brothers against each other.

In the suit yesterday, the complainant avers that on or about August 1, 1898, he entered into a contract with Frank Atwell and the defendant, Thomas Stubblefield, by the terms of which he agreed to place to the credit and at the disposal of said firm as trustees, the sum of at least \$5,000, and a larger amount at his discretion, which they accepted as a special fund.

Was Special Fund.
This sum, it is claimed, was to be used for the benefit of Lee Stubblefield. The firm agreed, it is said, to keep a special and separate account showing the amount thereof loaned, with full description of the securities, name of borrower, one-half of all profits, interests, and commissions to be paid by the firm to the complainant.

It was agreed, also, it was avered, that the principal should be returned in manner provided by the complainant at his request. In accordance with this contract, Lee Stubblefield states that he paid over \$11,000 to the trustees, and that later Thomas W. Stubblefield acquired all rights and title to the firm of Atwell & Stubblefield, assuming the trust specified. Plaintiff says that large amounts of profits were made before and after his brother was made sole trustee, and that, though various sums were paid to him, no final settlement has ever been made.

Asks for Settlement.
He has, he says, received no information as to the balance due him since March 24, 1903, since which time he repeatedly asked for a settlement, and that it is his belief that the defendant intends to divert the balance of the funds to his own exclusive use and benefit. Upon the belief that there is a large profit from the fund, he asks the court to require his brother to make a full and complete disclosure of all the transactions in connection with the fund, and that the balance which shall be found due be paid to him. Answer under oath is waived. Attorneys Leckie, Fulton & Cox appear for the complainant.

WANTED LICENSE GRANTED.

Le Cuyer and Davis Have Excise Board Cited to Show Cause.

Upon a petition filed by Thomas B. Le Cuyer, Justice Gould, of the District Supreme Court yesterday cited the excise board to show cause next Monday why a writ of mandamus should not issue to compel them to grant a saloon license to the Columbia Hotel, 143 Pennsylvania avenue northwest, of which Mr. Le Cuyer is the proprietor.

The court is informed that Edwin W. W. Griffin, assessor of the District, Matthew Trimble, Samuel Kalbfus, and Alexander McKenzie, who constitute the excise board, have illegally refused to grant the license and ordered the barroom closed Monday, September 9, at midnight. Henry B. Davis, attorney for Le Cuyer, contends that as the application for a renewal of the license has been before the board since November 1, and that as no petition of a majority of the real estate owners was filed in protest, the excise board was without authority to pass an order declining to renew the barroom privileges.

The action of the board was based upon a recent hearing at which the police of the First precinct testified that the Columbia Hotel was patronized by a number of suspicious personages of both sexes. The hotel, it was stated, was constantly under the surveillance of the police, and they recommended that the request for renewal of a saloon license be denied.

MEAT PRICES NOT TO SOAR

Washington Dealers Do Not Look for Large Advance.

Local Butchers Are Inclined to Think the Reports from Chicago Are Exaggerated.

Although sad tidings come from Chicago that the price of meats and milk and provisions of all kinds will soar to the skies during the coming winter, the local dealers in these necessities say that no great change in prices may be expected here. They further are inclined to think that the reports from the Western city are greatly exaggerated and that, while there may be a flurry in the meat market, it cannot be lasting. Cattle and sheep have been plentiful this year as the weather has been to their advantage. Local butchers at least will make no adjustment in their prices.

Milk dealers say that the new regulations may increase the price of milk slightly, but that even this is not likely to be immediate.
