

GAS COMPANIES SUED

District Charges Failure to Comply with Law.

CANDLE POWER IS TOO 'LOW

Corporation Counsel Begins Action to Recover \$5,500 for Alleged Violation of Acts of Congress—Tests Taken by Inspector Claimed to Show Both Companies Culpable.

Corporation Counsel Edward H. Thomas, upon behalf of the District of Columbia, yesterday instituted suits against the Washington Gaslight Company and the Georgetown Gaslight Company to recover from these two companies the sum of \$5,500 for alleged violations of the act of Congress relating to the quality and purity of gas furnished to residents of the District.

Corporation Counsel Thomas charges the two companies with failing to furnish to consumers in the District gas of the required candle power.

Law in the Case. The law under which the two suits against the companies named are filed was passed by Congress June 5, 1896, and the standard of twenty-five candles fixed therein was afterward reduced to twenty-two candles, as stated above.

The court held that as the company had been incorporated after the passage of the law, its provisions should be taken as accepted by the company and read into its charter.

The court affirmed the validity of the South Carolina law providing for a fine of \$50 upon a railroad for failing within forty days to settle claims growing out of shipments wholly within the State.

ECHO OF OLD CASE

Mrs. Chadwick's Jewels Discussed in Court.

TRYING TO RECOVER RING

Matter Taken Under Advisement. Validity of the Fine Imposed on the Interstate Consolidated Street Railway of Massachusetts Affirmed by United States Supreme Court.

An echo of the remarkable financial transactions of the late Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick, who died recently while serving a term in the Ohio penitentiary, was heard in the Supreme Court yesterday.

According to the record, the ring was part of a choice assortment of jewelry upon which Mrs. Chadwick obtained a large loan from J. W. Friend, of New York. The lot included seven diamond and one pearl ring, diamond earrings, opal brooch, stickpins, &c.

The fact that the ruby ring was smuggled came to the Treasury Department from Friend himself, who was promised protection for his interest.
