MORE MONEY WANTED

Cortelyou Sends in Estimates for the Year.

INCREASES ALONG ALL LINES

Total Figure \$766,508,272.30—Secretary Makes No Cut in Sum Submitted by District Commissioners—Increase for Panama Canal is About \$6,000,000—Table of Estimates.

The annual estimates of expenditures necessary to run the government during the fiscal year 1920, sent to Congress by the Secretary of the Treasury yesterday, foot up \$766,508,272.30.

This is \$77,479,519 more than the estimates submitted a year ago for the fiscal year 1919, and \$56,220,648 more than the aggregate appropriated by Congress at the last session. The largest increase in estimates is under the head of public works, the figures being larger by more than \$38,000,000 than last year, and about \$23,000,000 larger than the actual appropriations under this head.

The biggest increase of all under the head of public works is for fortifications and defenses, the estimates calling for \$38,462,915, as against only \$6,861,833 last year. The most notable thing about this year's estimates is the great increase in amounts wanted for these public works that pertain to the army and navy. Beside the greater appropriations called for on behalf of the coast defenses, there are to be noted an increase of nearly \$8,000,000, or about 40 per cent, for rivers and harbors; one of more than \$5,000,000 for military posts; one of \$3,000,000—three times as large as last year's figures—for navy yards and stations, and several less important increases under the Navy Department.

The increase for the Panama Canal is about \$6,000,000, that is, \$33,183,143, as against \$27,161,367 last year.

District Estimates Stand. Secretary Cortelyou made no cuts in the estimates submitted by the District Commissioners, the aggregate of which is \$13,782,125.25. The appropriation for the current fiscal year is \$3,850,000. This leaves the amount of the appropriation wholly in the hands of the Congress, and while it is probable some cuts will be made, the Commissioners believe Congress will see fit to let their estimate pretty much alone.

One of the important recommendations is that of Secretary of the Interior Garfield, who wants an "under secretary."

Grand total: \$766,508,272.30. Although the increase under the national establishment, exclusive of public works, is \$5,000,000 less than the estimates of last year, the total is still in excess of the amount actually appropriated by more than \$16,000,000.

REAL ESTATE NOTES.

Harry Wardman, well-known builder, is preparing to erect fifteen two-story houses at 2401 to 2429 North Capitol street northeast. Mr. Wardman took out a permit for the buildings yesterday, which are estimated to cost \$250,000. A. H. Beers, architect, prepared the plans for the houses, which will be constructed of brick, with six rooms and bath.

Moore & Limerick have sold to J. Franey Brown lot 17, square 1283, having a frontage of 234 feet on Thirtieth street, just north of Q street. The purchase price is understood to have been about \$1700. Mr. Brown now owns 624 feet on this street, and it is his intention to erect a large apartment on this property at an early date.

Stone & Fairfax report the sale of the property at 230 F street northeast, a short distance from the New Union Station, the property being a three-story brick dwelling containing nine rooms and bath, and valued at \$5,000. This firm also has sold for A. M. Williams, the two-story and cellar brick dwelling at 1025 Tenth street northeast for \$4,200, which the purchaser will occupy as a home.

NO LIGHT ON TUNNEL WRECK.

Commissioners Unable to Find Witnesses They Want.

No additional witnesses appeared yesterday at the hearing before the District Commissioners relative to the recent wreck at the south end of the new terminal tunnel. Detective Burlingame, who had made an endeavor to locate several witnesses needed for yesterday's hearing, reported that his search had been unsuccessful. Those wanted were Richard Taylor, signal inspector, who resides in Baltimore, and who, according to Detective Burlingame, has been transferred to another point by the terminal company; William English, employe of the Union Switch and Signal Company; L. Mathews, carpenter for the Cranford Paving Company, and a Mr. Newman, who is at present employed in Altoona, Pa.

It was announced that the depositions of the engineer and fireman of train 21, who are still in the Providence Hospital, will be taken by Corporation Counsel Thomas, after which the Commissioners will decide what further action will be taken in the matter.

MEETING WAS NOT HELD.

Machinists Accuse Mr. O'Connell, President of Association.

Members of the International Association of Machinists in this city, and particularly those of the Columbia lodge, charge James O'Connell, president of the association, with having used his power to prevent a meeting of the Columbia branch last Sunday after seventy-five members of the organization had requested it.

It is said to be only necessary for a meeting to sign a petition to call a meeting. It was stated at Mr. O'Connell's office yesterday that he was in New York and his return was not expected until to-day.

Members of the association say that one of their members has received money from the Erie Railroad Company and used it to avert strikes.

These charges were to have been investigated at the meeting called for Sunday, and now the machinists want to know why a meeting was not ordered.

DIME SAVINGS BANK OPENS.

Depositors Keep Clerks Busy and Leave Upward of \$50,000.

The new Dime Savings Bank, with headquarters in the Ouray Building, Eighth and G streets northwest, started business yesterday. At 9 o'clock a line of depositors was waiting to enter accounts, and for the first hour the clerks were rushed to the point that it became necessary for the president and other officials to take pens and help out with the registering of accounts.

The smallest account opened was for one dime. The largest was for \$800. Up to the close of banking hours the line of depositors was constant through the day, and the cash received was between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

Maurice D. Rosenberg, president of the bank, expressed himself as being much gratified at the manner in which Washington had received the new banking idea, and he thought from the good beginning made the institution would soon be in a prosperous position among the banks of the city.

Want Hearing About Avenue.

T. J. D. Fuller, architect, and Davidson & Davidson and H. L. Rust, real estate brokers, yesterday requested that the Commissioners appoint a time for a hearing relative to the deflection of Connecticut avenue, between Kalorama avenue and Woodley road, northwest. The Commissioners were also requested that the work on the approaches to the new Connecticut avenue bridge be discontinued until property owners in that vicinity can be heard.

The fair in progress in Masonic Temple under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Society of the Church of Our Father, will be continued to-day and to-morrow.
