Public Tribute To-morrow to Late Dr. Stafford.

PLANS HAVE BEEN ARRANGED

Memorial Exercises to Be Held in Chase's Theater, Beginning at 8:30 in the Afternoon—Expected to Be Greatest Testimonial of Love and Esteem Ever Given Citizen.

The executive committee having charge of the arrangements for the public tribute to the memory of Rev. Father Denis J. Stafford completed its arrangements yesterday afternoon at the board room of the District Building, when a full committee was present, and all the details were carefully gone over.

The meeting promises to be the greatest public testimonial of love and esteem ever given to the memory of a citizen of the District of Columbia, and as will be seen from the programme, the array of speakers could not be excelled.

No tickets of admission will be required. Chase's Theater, with the exception of the boxes and the stage, will be thrown open to the public at 3:30 o'clock to-morrow afternoon, and the police regulations at the door will be such that admission will be easily and quietly made.

WASHINGTON PASTORS—LIV.

REV. GEORGE A. MILLER, Pastor of Ninth Street Christian Church, Ninth and Districts northeast. Mr. Miller was born at Mount Morris, Ill., in 1864. His parents had shortly before his birth moved to State from Hagerstown, Md. He was graduated from the classical and theological courses of Eureka College in 1889. In 1893 his alma mater conferred upon him the degree of master of arts. He has since taken a post-graduate course at the University of Chicago. Mr. Miller was a member of the class sent out by that university in 1904 to make a special investigation of the Holy Land and the Orient. He was graduated from the classical and theological courses of the Ninth Street Christian Church, coming to this city from Covington, Ky., where he had been pastor of the First Christian Church for thirteen years. Since coming to Washington his work has been successful. More than ninety members have been added to his congregation, and \$7,000 raised for church purposes, during the past year. The Sunday school under his direction has increased in average attendance over that of the previous year. It is now the second largest Sunday school in this city. The membership of the Ninth Street Christian Church totals 1,000, and is an active force in the northeast section of the city. Besides his parish work, Rev. Mr. Miller conducts the largest Bible class at the local Young Men's Christian Association.

BISHOP WILL PREACH

Episcopal Head of Eastern Oregon Visiting Here.

OCCUPIES PULPIT TO-MORROW

Communicants of Church in Anacostia Apply for Establishment of a New Parish to Be Called Congress Heights Parish—Archdeaconry Holds Winter Meeting.

The Right Rev. Robert Lewis Paddock, Bishop of Eastern Oregon, who is the guest of Bishop and Mrs. Satterlee at Episcopal House, is a son of the late Bishop John Adams Paddock, Bishop of Olympia, and a nephew of the late Bishop Benjamin H. Paddock, Bishop of Massachusetts. All his pastoral work has been done in New York City, first in connection with the Pro-Cathedral of Stanton street, in the lower East Side of New York City, and latterly in charge of the Church of the Holy Apostles at Twenty-eighth street and the Fifth Avenue West Side. It is this church which supports as its missionary to Mexico the Rev. L. M. A. Haughton. It has now given its pastor to be the chief missionary in Eastern Oregon.

The bishop is to preach at two of our churches to-morrow.

The committee charged with making arrangements for last Sunday's missionary mass meeting at Continental Hall, were quite chagrined to find it reported that the hall was without fire, interest and enthusiasm in missionary work having apparently been deemed sufficient to supply the necessary heat. The truth is the furnaces had been going all day Saturday and Sunday up to the time of the meeting, but Sunday's weather with its high wind and low temperature, combined with the fact that the hall is not yet entirely finished, pretty well routed the forces that were laboring to give a tropical welcome to the Bishop of the Philippine Islands, hence the report.

The General Society for the Care of the Aged and Infirm Clergy reports that it needs \$50,000 for the next two pension payments occurring before April 1. Toward this amount only \$18,000 is in hand. Failure to pay these pensions will mean much distress and suffering.

Prominent communicants of the church in Anacostia, with the hearty consent of the rector and vestry of Emmanuel Church, have made application for the establishment of a new parish, to be called Congress Heights parish. The application has been referred to the diocesan committee on the formation of new parishes. Rev. William Grayshaw, as assistant minister of Anacostia parish, of which Rev. W. G. Hasenport is rector, is in charge of this Congress Heights work.

The church at College Park, Md., Zion Parish, Rev. C. I. La Roche, rector, is to be consecrated March 8 by Bishop Satterlee, all necessary formalities having been completed with the rector.

At a meeting of the Cathedral Council, held Monday at Bishop Satterlee's residence, among the clergy present were Dr. Harding, Archdeacon Williams, Rev. G. F. Dudley, Dr. T. P. Packard, Rev. J. H. Baker, Rev. C. E. Brock, and Dr. Roland Cotton Smith. Among the laity were Mr. S. W. Kramer, Mr. Thomas Nelson Page, Dr. William C. Rives, and Mr. Melville Church.

A meeting of the archdeaconry was held Monday at Bishop Satterlee's residence, in the course of which he outlined the work of the council, which consists of thirty-seven prominent members of the diocesan convention. It transpired that there was a deficit in the diocesan mission treasury, the apportionments not having been met by the parishes and missions. About this Mr. Kramer, Dr. Harding, Mr. Melville Church, and Mr. W. D. Baldwin made brief speeches. Mr. Thomas Nelson Page also made an address containing sound, practical suggestions which greatly interested the meeting.

The Cathedral Chapter, which is a much smaller body than the council, is scheduled to hold a meeting on Monday, at 10:30 a. m., at Riggs Bank, to consider matters connected with the Boys' Choir School.

The winter meeting of the archdeaconry of Washington was held Wednesday at the Pro-Cathedral Church of the Ascension. Following a collation served at 1 p. m. the business session began at 2 o'clock. The members of the archdeaconry are not only clergymen, but laymen, and quite a number of the laymen were present.

Colored work was discussed, particularly the affairs of Calvary Chapel, the plans for the new building being on exhibition, but bids for the work have not yet been invited. It was suggested that the needs of colored work should be considered in the generosity of the congregations of the diocese on Good Friday next.

The subject of missionary self-apportionment was taken up and thoroughly discussed. Rev. Dr. Harding being the chief speaker.

Beginning yesterday and continuing until Monday next the Rev. Father O'Connell, O. H. C., will hold a series of conferences, and preach a course of sermons in St. James' Church, Eighth street, Massachusetts avenue, and C street northeast, every Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, at 10:30 a. m. Yesterday's conference was on "Bible Reading"; to-day's on "The Gift in the Holy Communion"; and that on Monday on "Vocations."

Each day the children of the parish are instructed at 2:30 p. m. At 7:30 p. m. the following sermons are being delivered: Friday, "God and the Soul"; Saturday, "prayer, a Battle"; Sunday, "Ahaz and His Vocations"; Monday, "Smiting with the Arrows."

Bishop Satterlee is to visit this parish March 2 to confirm candidates, and it is evident he will find them carefully prepared and trained in church doctrine and Bible truth.

Aside from the interest Episcopalians naturally have in the coming general convention of the Religious Education Association, which is set for February 11-13, with its supremely important theme underlying every day, "The Religion of Moral and Religious Education to the Life of the Nation," the platform contains features of special interest. There is first the address of Rev. George Hodges, D. D., dean of the Theological School, Cambridge, Mass., on "The Annual Survey of Progress in Moral and Religious Education." Dr. Hodges is always an entertaining and on that subject he will be at his best.

The Sunday School Commission System in the Episcopal Church is the subject assigned to Dr. Lester Bradner, Jr., of Providence, R. I. Dr. Bradner is rector of St. John's Church, Providence, which has a finely organized Sunday school.

The Rev. Dr. Floyd W. Tompkins, rector of Holy Trinity, Philadelphia, is always a popular speaker. There are fewer harder workers than he; it is all one with him. Whether summer or winter, he is always at work. His address is assigned to Dr. Lester Bradner, Jr., of Providence, R. I. Dr. Bradner is rector of St. John's Church, Providence, which has a finely organized Sunday school.
