Hold-up Man Confesses to an Attack on Snyder.

TWO OTHERS DENY THE STORY

Edward Drowns Turns State's Evidence and Implicates Wilbert Cook and Harry Hicks—Young Bandits Wound Victim, but Fail to Obtain Any Money—Indoor Carnival Closes.

Alexandria, Va., Feb. 27.—Before a courtroom crowded with interested spectators, Edward Drowns took the witness stand this morning in the police court and in a calm and collected manner turned State's evidence and graphically described how he and his fellow-prisoners, Wilbert Cook and Harry Hicks held up and shot Thomas J. Snyder on the night of February 11, on Shooter's Hill road, west of this city. At the conclusion of Drowns' testimony Justice H. Thompson held the prisoners for the action of the grand jury, and they were subsequently remanded to jail to await trial. The "peaching" on the part of Drowns came as a great surprise, and he was listened to with close attention by the large gathering.

The prisoners were arraigned at 10 o'clock this morning and the hearing consumed two hours. The first witness to take the stand was Snyder. The witness was positive that the three men in the prisoner's box were his assailants. Mr. Snyder described minutely how they followed him on the night of the shooting. He also told the court that he had seen the men earlier in the day. J. E. Miller, Robert Hoerlein, Davis Fewell, and others testified to having seen three men resembling the prisoners in the vicinity of the place where the shooting occurred on the night in question.

A man named Chichester testified to having met Snyder immediately after the shooting, and he said the latter said: "For God's sake, help me; three men just held me up and shot me."

Two Deny Complicity. Hicks and Cook took the stand in their own defense, and each claimed to have left Frank Parker's place, at the head of King street, in company with Drowns on the night of the hold-up about 10:30 o'clock. They also added that they never left Parker's place from the time they entered until they departed for their homes.

Drowns, upon taking the stand, said he and the other two men met at Parker's on King street, and deliberately planned to go up the road and hold up somebody. He then said that Cook gave Hicks a pistol, and the first man they came across was Snyder, and after demanding that he hold up his hands, they fired two shots, although he disclaimed having fired either of the shots. Following the shooting, he said, they returned to Parker's, two entering by way of a back fence, while one entered through the front door. The shooting of Snyder occurred while he was returning home from this city. Upon the approach of the highwaymen he complied with their request to hold up his hands, and was shot. It was evident they were bent on robbery, but after the shooting the men evidently became frightened, for they ran away. The bullet entered Snyder's left lung, and has not yet been removed. The day following the shooting the police arrested the man and afterward they were positively identified by Snyder as being his assailants. For a time it was thought at the hospital that Snyder would die.

Indoor Carnival Closes. The Elks' indoor carnival, which has been in progress at Armory Hall for the past ten nights, came to a close this evening. Many pretty prizes were awarded the successful drawers. Most of the goods remaining in the hall this evening were disposed of at auction. A large crowd was in attendance. The carnival was one of the most successful held here in recent years.

GIRL BURNED TO DEATH.

Rushes Back Into House to Save Some Treasures. Asheville, N. C., Feb. 27.—The residence of Mr. and Mrs. James Blazer was totally destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning, and Mr. and Mrs. Blazer's fourteen-year-old daughter Irene perished in the flames. The entire family got out safely, but the elder girl's death was caused by her rushing back into the house to get some treasures that she prized. In the burning building was a cat the girl was very fond of.

COUNTRY BIG ENOUGH

Ambassador Defends Policies of His Native Land.

DENIES WISH FOR EXPANSION

Declares It Untrue that Fatherland's Increase in Population Demands More Territory—insists Country's Record Shows Its Enthusiasm for Peace—Wants Free Competition.

New York, Feb. 27.—Saying the world is large enough and rich enough in still dormant possibilities to admit of pacific co-operation by all nations. Baron Speck von Sternburg, the Ambassador from Germany, in an article in the North American Review, published to-day, assures mankind that his country needs no colonies, and that what she wants is merely free competition on all seas, the open door and the right to co-operate freely on an equal footing with all other commercial and industrial nations in opening up new, and, as yet, unopened districts and markets.

No Designs on Belgium.

In his article, which he calls "The truth about German expansion," he also denies that Germany has designs on Belgium. He says it is not true that the increase of population in the Kaiser's domain makes more soil necessary to the existence of the people.

SCHOOL-TEACHER ACCUSED.

Young Woman Held in \$500 Bail in Gem Theft in New York. New York, Feb. 27.—A young woman, said by the police to be Miss Madeline Mendes, twenty-three years of age, a school-teacher, of 68 West Sixty-fifth street, was arrested last night, charged with the larceny of a locket and a diamond ring set with rubies and pearls, valued at \$500. The complainant was Julia Frawford.

LEE M. BOYER DEAD.

Former College Professor Passes Away After Brief Illness. Winchester, Va., Feb. 27.—Lee M. Boyer, one of the most prominent residents of Frederick county, died at his home near Winchester to-day, after a brief illness, aged 55 years.

Aged Captain in Prison.

New York, Feb. 27.—William H. Van Schaleck, the aged captain of the excursion steamboat Gen. Slocum, which was burned in the East River in June, 1904, received final commitment to Sing Sing to-day.

Hadley Welcomed Back.

New Haven, Conn., Feb. 27.—President Arthur T. Hadley, of Yale, received a rousing ovation to-day as a welcome on his return from Berlin. Nearly 3,000 persons, including Yale undergraduates, alumni, and New Haveners, gathered at the administration building and cheered the Yale president loud and long. Dr. Hadley responded with a brief speech.

BISHOP INGRAM IN BERLIN.

English Prelate on Way Home Talks of American Life. Berlin, Feb. 27.—Right Rev. Arthur Ingram, Bishop of London, who is on his way home from Russia, preached in the English church here to-night. There was a big muster from the American colony, presumably owing to the bishop's recent visit to the United States.

He repeated in part the sermon he preached in New York, saying that the wealthy were not the owners, but the stewards of their wealth. Among other things, he said he had noticed in America, as in England, a want of joy. He ascribed this to the want of true religion.

Conversing with your correspondent, Bishop Ingram said he regretted the publicity American newspapers had given to the game of tennis he played with President Roosevelt. It was likely to give a false impression of his true character as a bishop.

MASQUERADER'S NAME GIVEN.

Russian Consul Reveals Identity of Woman Who Posed as Man. Chicago, Feb. 27.—The real name of Nikolai de Reyhan, who for years posed as a man in this city and elsewhere in the United States, and who died at Tucson, Ariz., last fall was revealed by Baron von Schlippenbach, the Russian consul, who appeared in the probate court this afternoon and told Judge Walsh that the Russian woman's name was Anna Terletsky.

Her father is dead and the mother is still living. There were two children, Anna and Barbara, the latter dying when she was 16 years old. The proceeding was brought in proof of heirship.

DECORATED BY THE KING.

Edward VII Invests Two with Medals for Bravery. London, Feb. 27.—King Edward to-day personally invested two miners named Chandler and Everson with the reward medal for gallantry in coal mines. The Edward medal was instituted last October. The medal of the first class is of silver and that of the second class of bronze, bearing on the obverse the effigy of the King and on the reverse a design representing the rescue of a miner, with the inscription, "For Courage." It is to be given for such as may endanger their lives in saving or endeavoring to save the lives of others from perils in mines and quarries within the British dominions.

Take Exception to Interview. San Juan, P. R., Feb. 27.—The House of Delegates considers that the interview with Capt. R. E. Gambell, of the Porto Rico Regiment, lately printed in a Philadelphia paper, is an affront, and has sent a resolution to President Roosevelt, Secretary of War Taft, and Gen. Grant, asking for an investigation and the punishment of Capt. Gambell.
