

JONES IS SUSPENDED

Chicago Manager Placed Under Ban by Johnson.

WHITE SOX ARE HERE TO-DAY

Bill Burns Stated to Pitch Opening Game Against the Former World's Champions—Rain Forces Postponement of Closing Contest with St. Louis—Gossip of the Diamond.

When the Chicago White Sox reached here yesterday afternoon, Manager Fielder Jones received notice of indefinite suspension by President Johnson.

The suspension of the manager of the former world's champions is the outcome of Wednesday's game at Philadelphia, when Jones became involved in an argument with Umpires Connolly and Egan. When Jiggs Donohue made the claim that Harry Davis had left third base before John Anderson had caught a fly ball, Jones came in from center field. Ordering his players aside, Jones took up the matter, but Egan refused to listen, and Jones went to the center of the diamond and renewed the argument with Connolly. According to the Chicago players, the argument had proceeded only a couple of minutes when Connolly ordered Jones out of the game.

Ban Johnson said last night that he had simply received a telegraphic report on the case, and that he would not decide upon the length of the suspension until he gets Connolly's complete report. Coming at this time, the suspension of the manager is likely to prove a drawback for Chicago in the league race.

The rain yesterday made baseball here out of the question. As Cantillon was more than anxious to get another chance at the St. Louis team, he postponed calling off the game until the last minute, in which it was seen that it would be impossible to get the grounds into shape.

The Browns caught an early train for Philadelphia, and had hardly left town when the Sox reached here from Philadelphia, the third game with the Athletics being postponed.

President Ban Johnson was disappointed at not being able to see the Nationals in action, so he decided to remain over to-day. Tomorrow he leaves for Philadelphia and then goes to New York.

The league's executive lunched with the officials of the local club, and for more than an hour the magnates discussed several questions in relation to the club.

While greatly chagrined at being forced to remain idle for several days, Fielder Jones is well satisfied with the Sox. "We have not been hitting much of late, but our club is in good shape, and we will be up in the fight before long," said the leader of the Sox. "From every point it looks as though there is to be the hardest sort of a race this year. While I have not seen the Washington club, I am satisfied that it will be a much harder team to lick than it was last year. Joe Cantillon has picked up a lot of promising players, and I would not be the least surprised to see Washington the biggest sort of a factor in the scrap for the pennant."

The Georgetown team is primed and confident of wiping out the defeat of earlier in the week by beating Fordham at Georgetown Field this afternoon. Cantwell or Diamond will pitch against Mahoney.
