UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA NOT SCORED ON IN 55 INNINGS.

COACHED BY COLLEGE MEN

State University Team Has Made Clean Sweep of Colleges in that Section Under Coaches Hammond, Johnson, of Virginia, and Branch Boone, of Georgetown.

The most wonderful record for consecutive shut-outs ever recorded by a ball team, professional or college, has been made this season by the University of Georgia, which nine has not been scored on in the last fifty-five innings.

What adds to the record of the team is the fact that it has been handled entirely by coaches who have never played professional baseball—Branch Boone, of Georgetown, and Hammond Johnson, of Virginia. While Johnson is the head coach, he has received assistance from the Georgetown graduate, who is practicing law in Athens.

Not only has Georgia made a new shut-out record, but has not suffered a single defeat at the hands of a college team, although playing an average of three games a week since the first of April.

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
