GRIFFITH NO LONGER NEW YORK MANAGER

Veteran Resigns Position as Leader of Yankees Because of Failure of Team to Come Up to Expectations in American League Race.

New York, June 24.—Clarke Griffith, who was manager of the New York American League baseball club ever since that club has been in existence, had a long talk with Frank Farrell, the owner of the club in Philadelphia to-day, the talk culminating in the resignation of Griffith as manager.

The Yankees, after making a most encouraging start this season, began to hit the downward path about a month ago, and since then things have been going from bad to worse. To those who followed the club's affairs closely the resignation of Griffith came as no surprise.

Griffith's health has been none too good this season, and the worries of repeated defeats weighed heavily upon him. He always was a hard loser, and steady reverses coming after brilliant beginning did not make his pathway any easier.

It was his intention to take a rest for a month, and he will leave the team tomorrow. He said to-day, however, that he did not expect to quit baseball for good just at this time. He has nothing definite in view, but thinks it is not at all unlikely that he will strike a managerial berth somewhere in due time.

NORMAN ELBERFIELD. Norman Elberfeld will be the team's manager in the place of Griffith. Griffith was an American League pennant when he was manager of the Chicago White Sox before coming to New York.

WILD THROW COST PENNANT. The New York team did not prove much of an success this year, but in 1907 a wild throw lost the American League pennant for the Yankees. A year ago there was some dissatisfaction with Griffith's management, but Farrell decided to allow the manager to have another chance.
