

BRYAN ANGLING FOR VOTE OF FARMERS Bank Guaranty and Packers' Trust the Temptation.

NEBRASKAN AFTER THE WEST

Receives Gourd as Emblem of Holy Republican Promises, and Prizes Dollar as a Price of People's Rule, at a Conference Over Funds for the Campaign.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 13.—Several conferences during the last few days have had for their object the devising of ways to reach the farming vote. Two leads have been struck. One of these, which Bryan has strongly insisted upon, although some of his advisers have suggested it is a rather dangerous one, is to bear down on the Democratic plan of a guaranty that will make safe the farmers' money now in the banks.

Conference Over Funds.

Mr. Bryan held a conference to-day with members of the notification committee and other. One of these was with Reese, the Tennessee member of the finance committee. They discussed a plan for realizing funds in Reese's district, the Southern Mississippi valley. Reese said afterward that he proposed devoting his time to getting small contributions from as many persons as he could, as he wanted Mr. Bryan to go into the White House "with no obligations except to the people."

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"I Gave My Dollar"

A campaign fund button, price one dollar, has made its appearance. Above Bryan's picture appears "I gave my dollar" and underneath "Did you?" A gourd shaped like a big stick was presented to Bryan by a party of Otse County Democrats. In his speech Bryan said: "I think that the gourd is a fitting emblem to represent Republican policies for the big stick. The stick which has been so loudly proclaimed as the best accomplished a great deal in the way of actual legislation. Republican leaders have so steadfastly opposed reform that the big stick has been quite empty—as empty as this little gourd in actual results. The gourd, the gourd may fitly symbolize the hollowness of Republican promises, and the fact that Republican policies have nothing in them of good to the farmer."

People's Money People's Vote.

In acknowledging a \$50 contribution from as many farmers Bryan said: "One of the chief reasons for the delay of reform has been that a few great corporations have been supplying the Republican party."

NEWMAN MAKES AN APPEAL CALL JUDGES AND CLERKS

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 13.—Two more true bills were returned to-day by the grand jury investigating the State primary frauds here. To-day's indictments are in connection with the assault made upon Manuel Reynolds in a polling place where he acted as a judge. Bench warrants will be asked for to-morrow. It is understood other indictments will be returned as the result of the assault upon Reynolds.

Hongkong, Aug. 13.—One thousand soldiers stationed at Kongshan, near Wuchow, mutinied yesterday because a comrade had been arrested for gambling. The mutineers murdered their commander, his clerk, and secretary, and they attacked a camp of soldiers at Ouyung. The loyal soldiers fled to the roofs, and the mutineers pillaged the village, securing \$10,000 in money. They then rejoined the rebels in the Taping Mountains.
