SAYS HACKER WAS UNMARRIED Father of Woman's Fellow-suicide Claims Body. Tells Coroner His Son Had Told Him He Was Living with Men Friends. New York, Aug. 20.—William G. Hacker, of Newark, father of Edward Hacker, who committed suicide with a revolver with which his wife had killed herself a short time previously, yesterday afternoon, visited the coroner's office to-day to claim the property turned over to Property Clerk Cassidy when Coroner Dooley assumed jurisdiction in the case. When shown a gold watch, two gold chains, a pair of cuff buttons, and some other trinkets Mr. Hacker said to Cassidy: "I can't give you a receipt for all of that jewelry. Those chains belonged to the woman and I don't want them. I will bury my son, but I will have nothing to do with the body of the woman nor with any of her effects. "A week ago my son told me he was living with men friends. I asked him he ever thought of marrying and he said he had not married and did not think he would. I never suspected that he was and I believe his statement to me that he was not married."

WILL UNVEIL MARKER Ceremony at Culpeper, Va., in Honor of Union Soldiers. With brief ceremonies, there will be unveiled in the National Cemetery at Culpeper, Va., to-morrow a bronze and granite marker in honor of the officers and soldiers of the Seventh Ohio Infantry who fought at Cedar Mountain on August 9, 1862. It is expected a number of Washingtonians will attend the exercises, and a special train will leave Union Station at 8:15 o'clock to-morrow morning for Culpeper. Col. Selden A. Day, retired, of the United States army, will be the orator of the day. A feature of the exercises that will add interest to the occasion will be the reunion between the A. P. Hill Camp of Confederate Veterans with the veterans of the Seventh Ohio Infantry. Following the dedication of the memorial, a dinner will be served the veterans.

Dies Trying to Save Comrade. Bristol, Pa., Aug. 20.—Elvin Smith and John Hughes, Burlington boys, were drowned in the Delaware River here early this morning. Hughes, who was unable to swim, slipped and fell into the water, as he was stepping into a row boat, and Smith, in a vain effort to save him, lost his life. The bodies of both have been recovered.

NEWS OF THE VIRGINIAS POLITICAL AND OTHERWISE.

The Virginia Olympic athletic games and horse tournament, to be held on the Horse Show grounds at Manassas on next Wednesday, August 27, will be one of the greatest events ever held in Prince William County, Va. The entire day will be one of exciting contests. The grounds are in perfect condition, and the entry lists for the tournament, obstacles races, and the many other events are well filled.

The agricultural commissioner of Virginia, Mr. George W. Kolner, is daily receiving letters asking for information concerning lands in the Old Dominion. These letters come from all sections of the country and tend to show the increasing demand for Virginia homes. The latest list includes inquiries from North Dakota, Texas, Iowa, Minnesota, California, Canada, New Mexico, Wisconsin, Colorado, Missouri, Pennsylvania, Nebraska, Ohio, and Illinois. The resources of the State are receiving the attention of investors from everywhere, and the influence of its numerous industries is being felt more and more.

The Virginia rifle team at Camp Perry is doing much better shooting than the best last week. In the regular team's skirmish matches they entered merely to show their marksmanship, but they acquitted themselves remarkably well, and out of forty-eight contestants, their standing was twenty-sixth, quite an advance for them, as they usually bring up in the rear.

Hon. J. W. Marshall, the "Cyclone" of the Ninth district, says: "All this talk about a possibility of Virginia going Republican is all moonshine. The Congress, should it be elected, will remain as it is now, nine Democrats to one Republican, with a possibility of its being Democratic. The 'Cyclone' sees no reason for a break in the South South."

The construction of the inland waterway between Norfolk, Va., and Beaufort, N. C., has been begun. Condensation proceedings are being instituted in order to get possession of land that cannot be obtained in any other way.

The old Rumsey millstone, once the property of James Rumsey, the real inventor of steam navigation, will be placed on a large concrete base in the public park at Berkeley Springs, W. Va. James Rumsey lived in Berkeley County, and owned a mill at Sleepy Creek.

Many years ago this stone was purchased by D. Pratt Wright, son of the late Judge Wright, of Baltimore, who spent his summers at Berkeley. Later, it was purchased by A. L. Wilson, who understood that it was to be placed in the public park.

At the present time, this is the only visible token of appreciation or gratitude of steam navigation, although plans are being perfected for the erection of a monument to his memory at Shepherdstown, W. Va.

The first list of entries in the department of needlework and embroidery of the Virginia State fair came from Denbigh, the county seat of Warwick, and was mailed by Mrs. J. C. Curtis. There were twenty-eight entries in the list, running through the following classes: Embroidered articles, centerpieces, drawwork, handkerchiefs, sewing, burnt-work, and miscellaneous. The early receipt of this list, two months ahead of the fair, and the fact that many letters have been received at the office of the fair, requesting information, show that there is a high degree of interest felt, and argues well for the success of the fair.
