TROOPERS GIVE DRILL

Field Artillery Presents a Dashing Exhibition.

EVOLUTIONS ARE INTRICATE

Society Folk Hill Gallery, and Applause is Unstinted—Verdict is that Exhibition is the Best Ever Given at Post by the Artillery. Battery F Appears for First Time.

With a blare of trumpets, Battery D dashed out of the riding hall at Fort Myer yesterday, thus ending what is termed the best drill ever given by the field artillery at that post.

A programme of varied evolutions served to attract a large audience, and the proceeds were donated to the artillery branch of the Army Relief Society. The entire south gallery was filled with society people, and their applause for the troopers was unstinted.

There were many features about the drill that made it unique. Battery F appeared for the first time in a public exhibition, having just returned to the United States from Cuba. For the first time in the history of the military service, this troop played a game of mounted push ball that furnished much sport and excitement.

Capt. T. N. Horn, in command of Battery D, carried off the honors with his series of intricate maneuvers, executed with a dash that characterized the cannoners as almost perfect in this branch of the exhibition.

Horse a High Jumper.

Sergt. J. Young, of Battery E, with his high-jumping horse, schooled by himself, captivated the lovers of the outdoor sport and cleared the bar at five feet.

Capt. T. H. Hennessy directed the movements of Battery E, and also put his mount, trained for high school work at Fort Riley, through various paces, which were well received by the fair sex.

In the pushball game, four troopers composed each team, known as the blues and the browns, and for more than twenty minutes they struggled up and down the field. The blues scored 5 points while the browns made 4.

This event developed the skill with which the horses have been trained to rush the large sphere almost as well as their masters. Several times the adroit moves of the mounts brought the on-lookers to their feet.

A Day in Camp.

The military tactics executed by Batteries D and E proved attractive, and when the latter opened the drill with movements illustrating a day in camp, each command was watched with interest. The caissons were loaded, and the horses harnessed to the carriages.

As Capt. Hennessy put the men through their paces, increasing the speed of the horses at each turn, the applause that greeted the orders was drowned in the noise made by the rumbling of the wheels.

The dashing of the mounts, twelve abreast, up the center of the hall was the auspicious entry of Battery F. Its first number was "The Indian Ring," followed by the "star figure" by the cannoners, with double eights by the guidon sections.

Following this clever drill the revolving wheel with center guidon was performed. This was a feature of the afternoon. "Criss-cross into battery" was the command then given by Capt. Horn. Immediately the flying platoon turned the galleries into a cheering mass. Round and round the inclosure with increasing velocity sped the cordons. This scene was an imitation of the chariot races of ancient times. When the troops came to a halt there were twenty-four horses abreast, awaiting the next command.

Intricate Figures.

Stakes were driven in the center of the hall, and through these narrow paths the flying squadrons galloped, executing spiral movements and intricate figures. The bugler sounded retreat, and as the gates at the extreme end of the hall opened out sped the artillerymen with colors flying in triumph.

Congratulations were showered on the officers at the conclusion of the exhibition, and the companies as they passed by the crowds on their way to quarters were again cheered.

FREUND SUED FOR \$10,000.

Rebecca Mitchell Seeks Damages for Alleged Injuries. Isador Freund was yesterday sued in the District Supreme Court for \$10,000 damages for alleged personal injuries by Rebecca E. Mitchell. The complainant, through her attorney, V. L. Dodge, says she was knocked down by the defendant's carriage on December 31 near Tenth street and New York avenue through negligence.

New Edition on Water Supply.

John H. Walker, clerk of the Senate Committee on the District of Columbia, has compiled a new edition of his book on the "Purification of the Washington Water Supply." It has been printed as a public document, and is attractively bound in cloth.

CASES OF LIQUOR SEIZED.

"Buchu Gin" and "Holland Gin" Are Labeled by Government. Ten cases, labeled "Balrd-Daniels Company's Distilled Buchu Gin," and five cases of "Hurdle Holland Gin," were labeled yesterday in the District Supreme Court by the government, through United States Attorney Baker.

The goods are claimed to be the possession of A. E. Heitzel, 401 O street northwest. On the petition of Mr. Baker, Justice Stafford issued warrants of seizure, returnable on April 16. The complaint declares the goods are misbranded, the "Hurdle Brand Holland Gin" purporting to be distilled in Holland, whereas it is held to be made by the Balrd-Daniels Company, at Warehouse Point, Conn.

Will of Matthew Donohue Filed for Probate. The will of Matthew Donohue, who died last Saturday, was filed for probate yesterday, bearing the date of February 13 last. Rev. Thomas J. Kervick, pastor of the Church of the Holy Name, and Rev. Mr. Coughly, pastor of St. Stephen's Church, are each given \$250 for masses. Other bequests are made as follows: To John Donohue, \$100; Kate O'Dea, \$50; Mary Donohue, \$100; Barbara Donohue, \$100; Bridget Donohue, \$50; Bridget Kilmartin, \$50, and Matthew Donohue, \$100. The remainder of the estate is bequeathed to a brother of the testator, Martin F. Donohue, who is named executor without bond.
