PRESIDENT AVENUE WILL BE A REALITY

Part of Sixteenth Street Will Be So Named Shortly.

COMMISSIONERS PLAN ACTION

Will Change that Part of It Extending from Florida Avenue to the District Boundary, Which is Within Their Jurisdiction—Believed It Will Influence Congress.

"The Avenue of the Presidents" will become a reality within the next ten days, if present plans are carried out. Sixteenth street, from Florida avenue to the District boundary line, will cease to exist.

Not awaiting action of Congress that would enable the entire boulevard which furnishes the most inspiring vista in the Capital to assume its new title from the White House to the outer extremity, the Commissioners will change that part of it which lies within their jurisdiction. They are given power to alter the names of streets and roadways beyond the city limits.

Property owners along the entire line of Sixteenth street have expressed themselves in favor of the change, and recently a meeting was held at which it was decided to lay the matter before the Commissioners. It is recognized that no action of Congress is possible during the tariff session, and the matter will not be presented to it before the next session in all probability.

Talks with Maj. Judson. Representing the Sixteenth street property holders, John Joy Edson called upon Engineer Commissioner Judson yesterday to enlist his support for the movement. The discussion was purely informal in its nature, and no attempt was made to have Maj. Judson definitely commit himself. He said "he was inclined to favor the change."

Commissioner Macfarland has already endorsed the movement, and Mr. Edson will call upon Commissioner West to-day. The approval of the latter is taken for granted. It is understood a meeting of the Board of Commissioners will be called within the next few days for the express purpose of rechristening the street, and it is believed that the change will go into effect at the earliest possible moment.

That property values in Sixteenth street have not reached the point to which its situation and its splendid future entitle it, is conceded. Residents have held that the prosaic and characterless common which it bears has been a barrier to its development. Commissioner Macfarland also holds this view.

WILL PRACTICE FOR SHOOT.

Schoolboys to Prepare for Easter Week Tournament. Schoolboys of the city will practice Saturday afternoon and evening with 22-caliber Springfield rifles for the schoolboy rifle shooting tournament, Easter week, April 12 to 17, inclusive. It is expected more than 600 boys will participate during the week, and some handsome prizes will be presented.

The shooting will be at 50 feet, under the rules of the National Rifle Association. The contest, which will be under the auspices of the National Capital Rifle and Revolver Club, will be held at the War Arsenal, Fifth and L streets northwest.

The order of events is as follows: April 10, 12 and 13, practice and record scores for medals; April 14, teams from the several schools; April 15, company team match, four men; April 16, battalion and team matches; April 17, interschool rifle match.

Officers' competition to be shot continuously during the meet. The interschool rifle match for the interschool gallery championship of the United States will be held under the auspices of the National Rifle Association, as in all parts of the United States, from April 12 to 17. The prize is the championship trophy, and it will be held for one year by the school winning it, when it will again be put in competition.
