



TRIAL BEGUN AGAIN

New Jury Sits in the Case of Elder and Wife.

ACCUSED OF GRAND LARCENY

Mrs. Elder, on Stand, Declares Carpenter Still Owes Her Between \$30 and \$35 on Account of Services Rendered Mrs. Carpenter During Her Illness and for Medicines, &c.

With a new jury in the box, sworn in at the order of Justice Anderson on account of a violation by one or more of the previous panel of the court's injunction against talking about the case out of court, hearings were begun yesterday in the trial of Frank D. Elder and his wife, Adreas Pearl Elder, charged with grand larceny, for the alleged taking of a large quantity of silverware, china, linen, and wearing apparel from the home of George D. Carpenter, 122 East Capitol street, where they boarded.

Declaring that Carpenter still owes her between \$30 and \$35 on account of services rendered to Mrs. Carpenter during her illness, and for food and medicines purchased, for which she was not reimbursed, Mrs. Elder took the stand yesterday in her own behalf.

She Gave Her Name.

When asked what her name was, she replied: "Adreas Pearl Mason," and explained that her husband had changed his name when he came to Washington, as he had lost his position with a street car company and was afraid he could not get employment here with that record against him. Mrs. Elder said she obtained a position as maid in the Ebbott House, which she left to go to the home of the Carpenters. She declared she looked upon Mrs. Carpenter, who died recently almost as a sister, and "did for her" in every way she could to make her illness easier. When shown a kimono, one of the articles of apparel the government charges her and her husband with stealing, Mrs. Elder declared, "That kimono didn't hang straight on Mrs. Carpenter and she gave it to me." The witness testified that she got the silverware on exhibit in payment of Mrs. Carpenter's alleged indebtedness, and gave a receipt for it.

Many of the alleged stolen articles were identified by Miss Mary Elizabeth Reamy, a trained nurse, who attended Mrs. Carpenter for three weeks before Elder and his wife left.

Detectives Bermann and Cox testified as to the investigation which led to the arrest of the two defendants in Lisbon, Ohio.

WAR ON THE GROCERS.

Effort to Be Made to Stop the Sale of Intoxicants.

A large gathering, representing the united church sentiment of the West End, met at the residence of Mrs. Zed H. Copp, 165 Wisconsin avenue, last night.

The leading topic was planning the ousting of intoxicants from grocery stores. Stories were told of families made destitute by the liquor habit. Definite plans were discussed, and a campaign organized, which will be pushed with vigor.

Rev. James Marshall, D. D., pastor of the West Street Presbyterian Church; Mrs. Don P. Elaine, and Miss Margaret Simpson were among the speakers. Misses Artha and Susanna Copp sang "We'll Make the Map All White." Refreshments were served.

The union decided to hold a picnic, and upon invitation of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Brown, it will be held at their home, "Hill Crest," on June 2.
