

PHILIPPINE DUTIES AIDED IN SENATE

Reduction of Cigar Importations Cause of Hitch.

LA FOLLETTE TRIES BIG CUT

Senator Burkett Stirs Debate When He Declares Committee's Amendment Snacks of "Petty Politics"

The Senate devoted another day to the consideration of that paragraph of the tariff bill which relates to the Philippines.

When an adjournment was taken Monday night, it was expected that the matter would be promptly disposed of yesterday morning.

When Senator Aldrich asked that the matter go over until yesterday, just before the adjournment of the session Monday night, he promised that the Finance Committee would consider the subject matter of Mr. La Follette's amendment in the light of a memorial submitted on behalf of the International Cigarmakers' Union, and the chairman of the committee admitted that the amendment of the Senator from Wisconsin might be agreed to.

Senator Aldrich declared that the United States should never have gone into the Philippines, that our government had forced itself into the Eastern situation, and that it was now acting selfishly with the other nations there, especially with Japan.

Mr. Newlands declared that the United States had insisted on an open door for Manchuria, but had shut out all other nations from equal trade advantages with the United States in the Philippines.

Senator Root defended the policies of the United States in the Orient, but finally became tired of Senator Newlands' ideas of diplomacy and left the chamber.

Senator Aldrich appealed to Mr. Newlands not to enlarge the scope of his remarks, but to permit the pending paragraph to be voted on.

"If we allow the debate to branch off into every phase of every diplomatic question," said Mr. Aldrich, "we will not get through with the tariff debate until next winter."

It was announced that the reduction proposed by the Finance Committee in accordance with an amendment offered by Senator Burkeley, of Connecticut.

This aroused Senator La Follette's friends, who scented a plan to deprive the Senator from Wisconsin of the political capital that might flow from having championed legislation beneficial to the cigarmakers.

Senator Burkett, of Nebraska, who has voted with Mr. La Follette on most of his amendments, made an attack on the Finance Committee charging that the committee's amendment smacked of "petty politics."

"But the Senator from Wisconsin grinned, and declared that he was able to take care of himself.

"I don't want to leave the Senator from Wisconsin up in the air," said Mr. Aldrich. "Nobody can do that except in such a way as to ignore utterly the principles of protection as taught by the Republicans themselves."

Then followed an extended debate, in which the Finance Committee was ably defended by Senators Gallinger, Dick, Depue, and Oliver.

At the conclusion of the talk, which lasted four hours, the committee voted down Mr. La Follette's amendment, 27 yeas to 38 noes.

Owen Flays Tariff Makers. Before Mr. Aldrich was able to get an agreement on the committee amendment and get the Philippine paragraph disposed of, Senator Owen, of Oklahoma, got the floor and began an exhaustive speech on the general subject of the tariff.

He declared the pending tariff bill violated every principle of protection, absolute or incidental, laid down by either the Republican or the Democratic parties.

DR. GORE EXPLAINS POSITION AT G. W. U.

Answers Charges Made by President Needham.

SIXTY-ONE STUDENTS IN CLASS

Declares He Was Approached by Head of the University and Asked to Co-operate in Movement to Save the Institution, and that Then He Did Discuss Its Affairs.

Editor The Washington Herald: I have positively refused to participate in the recent discussions in regard to the George Washington University, but the statement given out by President Needham, unless replied to by me, might be regarded as an acceptable explanation for my retirement from the institution.

I do not take issue with the opinion that my services are the least valuable to the university—the verdict of my students upon this matter has already been expressed in tangible form.

The actual registration of last session shows sixty-one students attending my classes, and the cost per student per hour in fees in mathematics and in any subject in the university. This answers the imputation that I have few classes and only a dozen students.

With the aid of a single assistant, instruction was given during the session of 1907-08, the last session for which the figures are available, to 186 students, at a cost per student-hour of \$6.34. Next to this in the matter of cost was the romance language, made purely elective, and of recent years has been discontinued. The number of students taking philosophy in every university is always comparatively small.

It is also known that for two entire sessions, when our classes were unusually large, I employed at my own expense an assistant who gave his entire time to helping with the class-room work, and that during the holidays I met for review all students who wished to attend a daily session.

A few weeks ago we were informed by President Needham that a large endowment must be raised by June 1 of this year or the university might be obliged to close. At this meeting a committee of the faculty was appointed to aid the board of trustees in securing funds, and I was designated its chairman.

Some days later I mentioned to two persons, who, presumably, were interested in extricating the university from a predicament that everybody considered critical.

I fully realized that to mention the university to a member of the board was in violation of the instructions Dr. Needham issued the first day he met the faculty, but I did not refer to the subject in conversation with the board in raising \$200,000, it seemed as though the unusual rule of silence would have to be broken or co-operation would be impossible.

Four members of the board have recently come to me to express their disapproval of the action taken with respect to myself, which shows that they too are violating the imposed rule of silence, and that dissention is not limited to the faculty. I shall not betray their views lest they, too, are dropped from their high calling.

It is a notorious fact that some of my colleagues were even more energetic than I in placing before the trustees suggestions for a change in the administration. It is not surprising, therefore, that I am referred to facts known to all of my colleagues.

He could have said that I was opposed to the division of education, as was the faculty that voted against it. He might have mentioned my opposition to the requirements for a degree in the college of the political sciences—a proposition that received the sanction of the council only by counting the votes of absent members.

But I thought that my opinion was wanted, and I expressed it frankly and fearlessly in the faculty, and never made our differences of opinion a topic of conversation with the board.

My uselessness must have developed rapidly. A year ago in informing me of a tardy increase of salary, Dr. Needham acknowledged his indebtedness to me, and just before that he named me chairman of a committee to consider the reorganization of the department of arts and science of the university.

The report submitted last October was adopted with only two dissenting voices, but never reached the board which had adopted it. This uselessness is also intermittent, for on June 5, of this year, Dr. Needham asked me "to help him save the university," and again on June 5, a similar proposition came from another official of the university. In both cases offers were made to restore me to my former position.

party affair, realizing that whatever the effect of its enactment may be on the country, the responsibility will be placed on the dominant party. For this reason he has been anxious to have the Republican Senators and Representatives put the tariff bill through as a party measure, and it is said that he is gratifying to him if he gets on its final passage in each House the solid Republican vote.

It will require a two-thirds vote of the Senate and later on a two-thirds vote of the House to adopt the amendment for submitting the question of changing the constitution of the several States.

The Republican leaders are sincere in offering their proposal to accomplish this, and will work earnestly, as they are doing now, to get the necessary two-thirds for its adoption by the Senate.

It is expected that after the direct income tax amendment offered in behalf of the insurgent Republicans by Senator Cummins, and the Democrats by Senator Bailey, has been voted down, the insurgent Republicans and enough Democrats to give the necessary two-thirds majority will vote for a substitute proposition to enable the State to vote on the question of changing the Constitution.

Sixty-one a Majority. There are ninety-one sitting members of the Senate out of a total constitutional membership of ninety-two. A two-third majority of this number is sixty-one, or one more than the entire Republican membership.

Representative Lorimer, of Illinois, who has been elected to the Senate, but has not given up his seat in the House, has agreed to be sworn in as a Senator if his vote is needed to help the Republican leaders, but his entrance into the Senate would be of no material assistance on the income tax proposition, as with the full membership of ninety-two it would require sixty-two votes to give the necessary two-thirds, still one more than the entire Republican membership.

New York, June 15.—Alton B. Parker, Martin W. Littleton, Edward M. Shepard, Eugene A. Philbin, S. Stanwood State Democrats, have combined to elevate the national Democratic party.
