### President Taft and Family Leave for Beverly To-day.

#### GEORGETOWN RECTOR TO WED

Mrs. Richard Poole Announces Engagement of Her Daughter, Anna Post Poole, to Rev. Walter Williams, of Grace Church—Mr. William F. Sands the Guest of His Father.

The President and Mrs. Taft, accompanied by Master Charles Taft and Mrs. Taft's sister, Mrs. Lewis More, the doctor, and two maids, will leave the White House to-day and make the trip in a private car straight through to Beverly, Mass., to occupy the Stetson cottage for the summer. Mrs. Taft, who is recovering from what promised at one time to be a serious illness, was at luncheon with the family on Thursday for the first time since she was taken sick. They will not return to the White House until October, although the President will return in a short time to remain here until the close of Congress.

The infant daughter of the Minister from Nicaragua, Senor Dr. Don Rodolfo Espinosa, and Senora Espinosa was christened yesterday afternoon. The ceremony was performed in St. Stephen's Catholic Church by Rev. Father Caughy in the presence of the parents, the Minister on Special Mission, Senor Don Pedro Gonzalez, and the First Secretary of the Legation and Senora de Rodriguez. The baby was born in the legation June 2, and was christened Nora. She is the first child of the new Minister and Senora Espinosa.

The engagement is announced of Miss Anna Cost Poole, daughter of Mrs. Richard Poole, of the Westmoreland, and the Rev. Walter Williams, rector of Grace Church, Georgetown. The marriage will take place in the early autumn.

Mr. William F. Sands, son of Rear Admiral Sands, and first secretary of the United States Embassy at Mexico, is on leave of absence, the guest of his father in this city. The marriage of Mr. Sands to Miss Edith Keating, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Keating, of Philadelphia, whose engagement was announced some time ago, will take place in the near future, as soon as Mr. Sands knows whether he will return to Mexico or be assigned to some other post. He was formerly first secretary in Maryland, and at Panama, and later first secretary of the legation at Guatemala, where he was succeeded by Mr. Algernon Sartoris, grandson of the late Gen. U. S. 

The scalloped border worked in solid stitch and the design in eyelet embroidery. This design may be worked in colors if desired, though they are not apt to wash well and therefore white is considered more desirable and the touch of color that is desired may be given by the ribbon, run through the worked buttonholes.

## G. A. R. CHIEF PETED

### Col. H. M. Nevius the Guest of Societies.

#### PRESENTED WITH A GAVEL

Gift Made from Historic Tree that Stood on Parapet of Fort Stevens When the Union and Confederate Forces Clash—Commander Lost Arm in the Engagement.

Col. Henry M. Nevius, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, arrived in Washington yesterday afternoon from his home, Red Brook, N. J., and was guest at several receptions of patriotic societies.

During the evening a reception was held in his honor by the Women's Relief Corps, Department of the Potomac, at the Soldiers' Temporary Home, Third and C streets northwest, at which Mary L. Gilman, national president, presided. The rooms of the home were decorated with flags, cut flowers, and other decorations, while on either side of the long hall stood the receiving line of women, who greeted Commander Nevius and his party.

At G. A. R. Hall, Admiral Porter Garrison, composed for the most part of veterans of the Spanish war, enjoyed an evening of song and story, in celebration of the trying events of the Spanish-American war, especially during the month of July, 1898.

Commander Nevius heard addresses by Col. L. Puzitt, United States Marine Corps, retired; William A. Hickey, and others.

Given a Gavel. Earlier in the evening at the Ebbitt House the Fort Stevens Lincoln Military Park Association presented Col. Nevius with a gavel made from part of a tree that stood on the parapet of Fort Stevens at the time of the engagement between Union troops and the Confederate forces on July 12, 1864, when the Southern troops made a dash to capture the National Capital.

Commander Nevius lost an arm in that conflict. He was a member of the Twenty-fifth New York Cavalry. This was the battle in which President Lincoln was under fire and stood on the firing line of the fight.

Many of those who took part in the exercises at G. A. R. Hall later attended the Women's Relief Corps reception. Among those present at the reception were Mrs. Mary A. Dow, department president of the Women's Relief Corps; Mrs. Adalade H. Feathers, chief of staff, and the following national aids: Mrs. Hattie E. Chaffield, Mrs. Anna E. Derval, Mrs. Tillie Entriken, Mrs. Fannie E. Pratt, Mrs. Ida N. Chase, Mrs. Ida V. Hendricks, and Mrs. Mary Roberts Bloodgood.

Representing the G. A. R. of the District were the following: Department Commander Edwin H. Holbrook, Col. B. F. Chase, department chaplain, Rev. J. D. Bloodgood, Commander of Lincoln Post, A. E. Chaffield, and Capt. Arthur Hendricks.
