Washington Gets an Even Break in Boston.

JOHNSON IS HIT HARD

Southpaw Burchell Very Much of an Enigma.

Cantillon's Braves Bat Three Pitchers All Over Lot in Early Session, While Groom Proves a Puzzle. Crowd of Thirty Thousand on Hand—Brilliant Work by the Members of Both Teams.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The Nationals and the Red Sox broke even to-day. Errors by Wagner enabled the Cantillon delegation to land the morning contest, 7 to 6, while in the afternoon there was another story told, the Red Sox winning 8 to 1, the Nationals being held down to two hits by Fred Burchell.

GAMES TO-DAY.

STANDING OF THE TEAMS.

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The crowd that saw the two games is estimated at 30,000, and it was classy ball playing that they witnessed. In the morning contest the home team used Chech, Schiltzer, and Wood, while Hughes and Groom worked for the visitors, the latter displaying form that was quite spiffy. His feat in the eighth of retiring the side on strikes won him great applause.

There was team play and individual work of high order shown by both teams. Milan, Conroy, McGriffe, Deleahanty, and Street excelled in the field for the visitors, while Lord, McConnell, Hooper, and Niles did the classy work for the home team, Wagner contributing his share in the afternoon.

Hughes Gets Bad Start.

Tom Hughes was sent to the mound in the morning game, but was yanked out in the third when things began to break badly. Groom was substituted, and it was plainly evident that no mistake had been made. Chech, who started the morning game for the Sox, was both wild and ineffective, and retired before the first inning was completed, the Nationals having registered three runs, Schiltzer went in until the sixth and Joe Wood finished up.

The afternoon for a while looked to be a pitchers' battle between Walter Johnson and Burchell, but along toward the sixth the Sox went to Walter, and it was apparent that the game was going to be the home team's.

The Nationals started off in the morning like champs. In the first Milan tripled, Chech lost his bearings, walking Conroy and McGriffe, Donohue hit Stahl, who had an easy play for Milan at the plate, but his throw was inaccurate, and the runner scored. Lelivelt hit one through the box, Conroy and Bob Talton, and that ended the run-getting in that inning.

Stahl tied it up in the second, Gessler walked and pliffed. Wagner flied out and Stahl fanned. For some unknown reason Hughes purposely passed Hooper to take a chance on the lead in the sixth, but he realized his mistake, because the latter hit the ball a terrific smash, and Milan was unable to stop it before it struck the fence. Pat had a homer to his credit, and the Sox were in the lead.

The Sox jumped into the lead in the third with one out. Lord singled. He moved up a peg when Niles' grasser got by Hughes, and scored when Hughes and McGriffe got Wagner's slam, but three wild throws in first trying to double Gessler, and Niles, who was on third, registered. Groom went in after Gessler had hit safely.

Schiltzer Blows Up.

Schiltzer's finish came in the fifth. Milan singled. Wagner flied to Conroy. Unglaub doubled, scoring Milan. On Conroy's walk to the lead in the sixth the Nationals clinched the game in the sixth after one man had gone. Wagner made a good stop off Street, but threw wide to first, and Charlie walked to second, a passed ball placing him on third. Groom fanned. Milan walked. An error by Wagner sent Street in and advanced Milan, who reached the plate on hits by Unglaub and Donohue.

The Sox got their final run in the sixth, Wagner, who had been passed, scoring on Jake's triple.

Afternoon Game.

Local fans like to see Walter Johnson, and when he was announced to pitch he was given a fine hand. The drumming that he received at the hands of the Sox was the worst he has sustained for many moons, and all were surprised, as they looked for a closer game, although they were rooting hard for the home team. Boston scored in the first, McConnell

single and advanced to second when Lord was retired. He scored when Niles flied to Lelivelt, as the latter returned the ball slowly to Del, and Del threw poorly to Street. The Nationals got their only tally in the third, and it was a weird one at that. With one out, Donohue smashed the ball to the center field bleachers, but only secured two bases, because he cannot run like Jimmy Rector. Burchell made a sensational throw off Milan's tap, but Stahl let the asset get away, and Johnson tallied.

In the fifth the Sox took the lead, Hooper walked and Donohue sacrificed. Burchell doubled and Hooper scored.

In the sixth, after a man had been retired, the Sox secured another pair of runs. Gessler singled, taking third when Wagner hit strictly. Stein pliffed second. Both scored when Stahl hit to right.

In the seventh, with two gone, there was more bother for Johnson, and, incidentally, for the Sox. Lord singled and Niles doubled, the drive of the latter going into the crowd in center field. Ordinarily it would have been good for a pair of shoes and other things. Gessler's hit sent Lord and Niles in.

In the eighth the Sox got two more. Conroy threw low, and Wagner was safe, taking third on Stahl's single. Jake stole second. McBride got Hooper's tap, and held the runners close to their bases. Then our modest young hero, Patricius Donohue, singled, and the runs came in.

Crowd of 10,000 Witness Interesting Aquatic Sports from Banks of the Schuylkill River at Philadelphia. Potomac Junior and Senior Eight Never in It from the Start.

Philadelphia, July 5.—In the presence of 10,000 spectators, the annual people's regatta was held to-day on the mile-and-a-quarter course on the Schuylkill river under ideal conditions. Of the thirteen events, Philadelphia oars captured eight, the rest going to New York clubs.

The Washington crews made a wretched showing in each event, trailing in a poor last among five crews in the junior race and last among four competitors in the senior race.
