

FAVORITES ALL LOSE

Students of Form Groggy When Day's Sport Ends.

JOCKEY CAME FOR DEFEAT

Grand Has Mount on St. Dunstan, the Favorite—Allows Himself to Be Shut Out at the Start and Stewards Will Probably Investigate the Race—Summaries at Sheephead.

New York, July 12.—Six favorites went down to defeat at Sheephead Bay today, and when the racing was over the students of public form were groggy. Not since the local season opened has the turf suffered such a crushing blow in one day. While ordinary racing luck and some miscalculation had much to do with the disaster the crowd did not hesitate to lay the blame for the defeat of St. Dunstan in the Selectman selling race to two-year-olds upon the shoulder of Jockey Grand. Wherever turfmen gathered to discuss this race after the red went up, the boy's name was on their tongues.

Because of his victory last Friday, St. Dunstan opened at 8 to 5. But it was soon apparent that practically all the smart set believed that Glennadean would get the money. So the price against Dunstan soared, while the odds on Glennadean were shortened until the latter went to the post favored at 17 to 10.

When the barrier was released, Grand, for some reason, pulled his mount up short and got him shut out. Contrary to the expectations of the wise men, however, Little King, who was ignored by the crowd, shot to the front with such a great turn of speed that he came home winner by a length and a half. Glennadean finished in the place. Grand's ride on St. Dunstan was very weak, and a rumor was soon current that the stewards would begin an investigation.
