### WANT HIGH WATER PRESSURE

Commissioners to Ask Congress for Appropriation of \$750,000.

Item Included in Former Estimates, but Each Year Plans Has Been Defeated.

Among the items to be included in the estimates of the District Commissioners for the annual budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, will be \$750,000 for the gravity high pressure water system for fire protection in the down-town section.

For a number of years the Commissioners have included this in the annual estimates, but Congress ignored the recommendation.

While \$750,000 is the estimated cost of the proposed improvement, the Commissioners do not ask this large sum in a lump. They will suggest an appropriation of \$50,000 a year for three years.

Already in anticipation of Congress making the appropriations for this work, the Commissioners have placed in the area to be covered by the system the large fire hydrants. They are temporarily connected up with the present water mains for fire protection. The district to be covered by the high pressure system is bounded by B and I streets north, and First and Eighteenth streets west.

Chief Frank J. Wagner, who served under Chief Belt, and who succeeded to the command of the fire department on the death of Chief Belt, is an enthusiastic supporter of the gravity high pressure system.

In a recent interview published in The Washington Herald, he pointed out the advantages of the system, calling attention to a big fire in the wholesale district of New York City, which was handled and confined to the walls of the buildings by the high pressure system without the use of a single steam fire engine.

**Cuba Sanctions Lottery.** The Cuban government is endeavoring to popularize the new national lottery. A law has been passed by the Cuban legislature authorizing the sale of lottery tickets, which will range in value from \$1 to 25 cents. Seventy per cent of the total value of the tickets pertaining to each drawing will be distributed in prizes. Drawings will be held four times a year. It is computed that the net profits to the government will be \$2,000,000 a year.

### PROTEST AGAINST FEES.

Real Estate Men Complain of Charges by Building Inspector.

Heikel & McLeran, real estate brokers, have entered a protest with the Commissioners against the fees for permits in the building inspector's office.

These fees, which went into effect July 1 last, were authorized by an act of Congress with a view of making the fees of the office sufficient to pay all expenses of the building inspector's office. They will more than meet that requirement.

Since the new fees went into effect, July 1, there has been a general protest from property owners, contractors, and builders generally. The complaint received yesterday by the Commissioners says that unless there is a change made in the fee rates a movement will be taken to bring the matter to the attention of Congress. It is pointed out that to obtain permission to repair a back fence costing \$150 the additional cost of \$1 has to be paid for a permit from the building inspector's office.

The Commissioners can offer no relief as the fees in force are collected under a law of Congress.

### PRINTERS' OUTING TO-DAY.

Law Reporter Company's Excursion Will Be to Chesapeake Beach.

The Law Reporter Company's annual outing to Chesapeake Beach for the benefit of the employees, with their wives, children, and friends will be held to-day.

The excursion is always a great event and interests about 200 people, including stockholders and employees. A programme of outdoor sports has been arranged, the principal feature of which will be a ball game between two teams selected from the men employees, and which promises to be spirited. The game will start promptly at 11 o'clock.

At the conclusion of the game a banquet of nearly 100 covers has been provided for at the Casino Hotel for employees and invited guests.

Among other events there will be swimming, tub races, and water polo.

### WILL CONTINUE SERVICES.

Open air services in three sections of the city will be continued to-morrow afternoon under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association.

At Franklin Park, Thirteenth and K streets, Rev. J. Henning Nelms, pastor of the Church of the Ascension, will preach a sermon, and at Lincoln Park, Twelfth and East Capitol streets, the address will be by Rev. F. W. Johnson, pastor of Grace Baptist Church.

Both these meetings will begin at 4 o'clock. Two hours later at the Roseade playground, Seventeenth and G streets northwest, Rev. George A. Miller, pastor of the Ninth Street Christian Church, will speak.

### ECONOMY THE WATCHWORD

Heads of Departments Will Exercise Care in Making Estimates.

Item for Improvement of Water Supply Will Be Eliminated Following Maj. Morrow's Report.

Economy will be the watchword of the head of every department of the District government in making up the annual estimates for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911.

These estimates are in course of preparation, and will be submitted to the Commissioners at an early date. Orders have gone out from the Board of Commissioners to the head of each department that unusual care and economy must be exercised in the estimates.

One of the largest items to be eliminated from the next budget will be the initial appropriation, a portion of \$5,000,000 for the improvement of the present water supply of the District. This will be made possible because of the report of Maj. Jay J. Morrow. This will not be needed for the next twenty years. Instead of Congress spending \$5,000,000 for that work, \$775,000 will put the present water supply service in condition to meet all demands that can be made upon it.
