

G. O. P. WILL OPEN "BAR" IN VIRGINIA

Republicans Will Have a Big Campaign Roll.

DEMOCRATS SHORT OF FUNDS

Reported that Democracy's Usual Source of Campaign Contributions Has Been Closed—Individual Republicans May Help Swell Their Fund for the Fight This Fall.

Special to The Washington Herald. Richmond, Va., Aug. 23.—Although the gubernatorial campaign has not struck its full, the indications at present are that the Republicans will have a big barrel of funds to open up, while the Democrats will have to make every cent count.

The statement is made that the usual sources, upon which the Democrats have relied in the past for contributions to pay legitimate expenses, will not come to the financial aid of the party this fall. It is further said that these contributors are holding back on account of the nomination of Judge Mann for governor.

Big Roll for G. O. P. On the other hand, there are many indications that the Republicans will have no end of campaign funds for the fight this fall. It is reported that the national committee may help finance the Virginia campaign, and certain individual Republicans, who are taking more interest than ever in the campaign, may come up with a big roll.

Alvah H. Martin, of Norfolk County, member of the Republican National Committee from Virginia, a near-millionaire, according to those who profess to know the state of his bank account, is throwing himself into the campaign with a great deal of ardor, it is said, and this leads some of the rank and file to believe he will contribute even more liberally than heretofore.

Mr. Martin attended the conference of the Republican executive committee in Roanoke Saturday night and left that night for New York. It is reported that his presence at the meeting meant that the national committee was interested in the fight the Republicans of Virginia propose to make, and that this interest would extend to financial aid.

Sleep Now Well Fixed. Representative Jascom Sleep, chairman of the State committee, recently has made a great deal of money in coal deals in Southwest Virginia and Kentucky and will undoubtedly support the campaign with money. He does not bear the reputation of being a stingy man when it comes to contributing to the cause.

In addition to all this, it is understood that the Republican officeholders under the Federal administration may be called on to contribute. Representative Sleep, as chairman of the State committee, can solicit contributions from Federal office holders, though he could not do so were he a Federal official. In addition, Mr. Sleep's position as the only Republican member of the House of Representatives from Virginia gives him a great deal of influence in Washington, where the appointments are made, such as is not enjoyed by the average member of Congress.

ENCOURAGES VIRGINIA G. O. P.

Letter from President Taft Received at Roanoke.

Roanoke, Va., Aug. 23.—A letter was received at State Republican headquarters this morning from President Taft, in which he spoke encouragingly of affairs in Virginia and indicated that substantial help would be given the Virginia Republicans in the campaign now being waged for the State offices.

Stanton, Va., Aug. 23.—L. P. Summers, of Abingdon, addressed a big Republican meeting here to-day and declared W. P. Kent will defeat Judge Mann in November. He referred to Mann as the "hyposite of Notoway," and paid his respects to him in regard to the Mahone letters in scathing terms. He also assailed the Democratic party and its adherents.

UNIQUE DOUBLE WRECK.

Decailed Freight Train Is Side-Swiped by Passenger.

Cumberland, Md., Aug. 23.—A unique double railroad wreck occurred eight miles from here to-day. A wrecked freight train was blocking the main track when it was "side-swiped" by a fast Baltimore and Ohio New York to St. Louis express. The engine and the mail car were wrecked, and Fireman William Brown, of Baltimore, was seriously injured. All the passengers escaped injury.

Fight over Williamson Post-Office.

Williamson, Va., Aug. 23.—A strenuous fight is being waged here for the postmastership between B. Randolph Bias, who has held the office for eight years; Fred W. O'Brien, a former newspaper man, and Greenway Hatfield, a former Democrat and former sheriff of Mingo County. The office pays \$2,300 a year. The contest is being waged here has been persistently active in politics.

Bishop of German Denomination Leaves Son in Baltimore. Hagerstown, Md., Aug. 23.—Rev. Eli Yourtee, for many years a bishop in the German Baptist Brethren Church, died last night at his home at Brownsville, this county, from inflammation of the stomach, aged seventy-five years.

Rev. Mr. Yourtee was a native of the Brownville section and resided there all his life. His activity and long connection with the Brethren denomination made him well known throughout Washington and portions of Frederick counties. His wife died nine years ago. He leaves the following children: Mrs. John Wolf, of Hagerstown; Mrs. Harry B. Fahrney, wife of Dr. Harry B. Fahrney, of Frederick; Dr. George Yourtee, of Burkittsville, Md.; Howard Yourtee, of Baltimore.

BOY DIES OF RABIES.

Lad Was Bitten by Mad Dog Last July.

Baltimore, Md., Aug. 23.—Harry Montgomery, the thirteen-year-old son of Mr. John Montgomery, of Nunamakers Mill, near Keedysville, Md., who had been suffering from rabies at the Mercy Hospital, having been brought to the institution for preventive treatment on the 1st of the month, died early this morning. The boy was bitten by a rabid dog July 2.

With young Montgomery when he breathed his last was one of the nurses of the institution. His father had been at the bedside for the past few days, faithfully watching and hoping. The usual violent convulsions that accompany the dreaded disease did not shake the worn frame of the sufferer. The lad was an extremely quiet patient.

The boy was playing in front of his home when the dog dashed down the road. The animal had bitten several dogs in its rampage. The little fellow shot a block of wood at the animal, which turned, and, jumping up, bit him in the left cheek below the eye. The animal was driven off by several men and finally shot.

MAY GAIN A REPRESENTATIVE.

West Virginia Hopes Census Will Show Increased Population.

Special to The Washington Herald. Huntington, W. Va., Aug. 23.—Prominent men of the State are of the opinion the census of 1910 will give West Virginia another Representative in Congress, increasing the total delegation in the Lower House from five to six. This would necessitate the complete rearrangement of the political map of the State and jeopardize the fortunes of a number of men who seem by the present arrangement to have the promise of an indefinite tenure.

The readjustment of the Congressional districts and the admission of an additional division would be fraught with much problems which would require much nice calculating to figure out to the satisfaction of the politicians.

The first consideration would be to determine on a course of procedure which would insure six Republican Representatives from West Virginia. Second to this would be that of pursuing a course which would leave unruined the feathers of the five Representatives now in office, and build up the new district out of the counties so situated geographically as to leave Hubbard in the First district and leave him dominant in the counties reserved to the First, with a similar course of treatment for Sturgis, Woodyard, Galnes, and Hughes.
