DEBTS OF \$500,000, SHE HAS NO ASSETS

Women's Club Founder Files Bankruptcy Petition.

WAS "THE QUEEN OF CLUB"

New York, Jan. 22.—Mrs. Dore Lyon, of 136 East Twenty-second street, has gone bankrupt. Anna E. is her name in her bankruptcy petition but to club women she is best known by the name first given. Her debts are half a million and she files a petition as a poor person, unable to pay the \$30 fees.

Her assets she describes as nothing at all. Her husband left her rich. He was a builder. She owes \$35 to five doctors, \$15 for medical service for a dog, \$50 for a plot in Greenwood Cemetery, debts for a camera, china, advertising, frames, dry goods, fire insurance, hay, horseboosing, lumber, millinery, plumbing, seeds, and stationery.

Mrs. Lyon is the daughter of the late Hanson Parker, Jr., and was born in this city just before the close of the civil war. She was educated in the convent of the Sacred Heart. She met her husband in the fall of 1881 and married him in February, 1882. Her husband was twenty years her senior, and was known as one of the largest speculators in real estate

BIG TOWER IN DANGER

Flood of the Seine Weakens Building Foundations.

PARIS SUBWAY NOT OPERATIVE

Swollen River Is Laden with Debris and Yellow Torrents Are Almost Flush with Banks—Troops and Firemen Called Out to Aid in the Work of Rescue.

Paris, Jan. 22.—The flood of the Seine threatens to assume the proportions of a catastrophe. The water at 3 o'clock had risen a foot since morning. The foundations of many buildings, and notably the Eiffel Tower, have been infiltrated and the structures are in danger of collapsing.

FIERCEST CONFLICT NEAR IN NICARAGUA

Unless Madriz Troops Surrender, Battle Is Sure.

Bluefields, Jan. 22 (by wireless from Colon, Jan. 22).—Messengers from the front this afternoon say that 4,000 of Estrada's troops are lined up between La Libertad and Acopyapa, prepared to attack the Madriz army at dawn on Sunday.

AGED MINISTER PASSES AWAY

Cumberland, Md., Jan. 22.—Rev. William A. Jackson, a retired United Brethren minister, died at Wilkinsburg, Pa., yesterday. He was born at Pleasant Hill, in the Shenandoah Valley, Va., seventy-nine years ago. He began his ministry at Mount Tabor, Va., in 1858, and traveled as a circuit rider over a course of nearly 100 miles. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Herbert Speck, with whom he resided, and two sons, William and Edward Jackson.

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 22.—In a head-on collision between two trolley cars to-day in Church street, Motorman Stempor sustained serious injuries and fourteen passengers were hurt.

PRISONER FURNISHES CLEW TO YOUNG GIRL'S MURDER

Naval Convict Would Turn States' Evidence in Rochester (N. Y.) Cemetery Tragedy.

Portsmouth, N. H., Jan. 22.—James Hall, a prisoner on the United States prison ship at the Portsmouth Navy Yard, to-day confessed to District Attorney H. H. Widener, Sheriff W. K. Gillette, and Assistant Attorney William J. Richter, of Rochester, N. Y., that he was implicated in the murder of Miss Anna Catherine Schumacher in the Holy Sepulcher Cemetery on August 7, 1898, and if taken back would turn State's evidence to convict the principal of the crime.
