OLD GOETHE MSS. FOUND.

Lost Version of "Wilhelm Meister" Will Illuminate Literature. Berlin, March 13.—An important discovery has been made at Zurich, Goethe's lost version of "Wilhelm Meister," in manuscript, has been unearthed from among some old forgotten papers, which are supposed to have belonged to Barbara Schultze, one of Goethe's friends, to whom he was in the habit of sending manuscripts.

The manuscript, which is 600 sheets, differs materially from the published version. Although it is not in Goethe's own hand, the genuineness of the papers have been recognized by high German authorities. Hitherto its identity had been hidden by the absence of both date and title.

HOSTS AT A BIG RECEPTION

Relatives and Friends Extend Felicitations to Venerable Couple Who Were Married in Germany Fifty Years Ago—Removed to This City in 1890—House Gayly Decorated.

Married half a century and now in the enjoyment of good health, Mr. and Mrs. Berrick Burnstine, with their children and grandchildren about them, and many friends extending hearty greetings, celebrated their golden wedding at their home, 112 Thirteenth street northwest, yesterday.

Twenty of the fifty years of their married life have been spent in Washington.

Married in Germany.

Mr. Burnstine is still in the best of health. He was born in Germany and married Marion Epstein there. When he first came to the United States he stopped for a short time in Cleveland, and in 1890 removed to Washington.

Mr. Burnstine was engaged in the optical business in Washington for the last ten years, and a short while ago retired. Flowers were received from friends throughout the city, and during the afternoon and evening many telegrams of congratulation were received. There were many who called personally to greet the happy couple, numbering 150 or more. The interior of the house was beautifully decorated, the color scheme being in gold, and was carried out to perfection. There were masses of flowers in the parlor and dining-room, and one particularly beautiful bunch of gold roses. The wedding cake was of white and gold.

Received Many Presents.

Some of the handsome presents received by Mr. and Mrs. Burnstine were a magnificent diamond ring, a hold-handled umbrella and cane to match, beautiful vases and dishes, and a tray with a glass bottom through which could be seen a beautiful hand-painted head of a young girl. They also received a great many \$30 gold pieces.

New York, March 13.—Count von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, and his wife came from Washington to-day to attend a musicale given at the von Ende Violin School to introduce the Baroness von Preuschen.

The Ambassador received, with his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Herwegue von Ende and Mrs. Amelia von Ende, and made a short speech, introducing the baroness to American guests.

MARQUIS TO BE BEST MAN.

Polavietni Coming to Attend Count Sigray's Wedding.

New York, March 13.—Count Anton Sigray, who is to be married to Miss Harriet Daly, daughter of Mrs. Marcus Daly, on March 29, will have as his best man that on occasion the Marquis George Polavietni, who is expected to arrive here Tuesday on the Kron Prinzessin Cecilie.

The marquis is descended from an Italian general of that name who fought against the Turks in the early eighteenth century. He is twenty-eight years old, tall, handsome, and wealthy. Besides being an imperial and royal chamberlain, he is a member of the Hungarian House of Lords and an officer of the Ninth Regiment of Hussars.

WILL HONOR CLEVELAND.

Birthday to Be Celebrated by the National Democratic Club.

New York, March 13.—Grover Cleveland's birthday will be celebrated by the National Democratic Club on March 18. A dinner will be given to which all the surviving members of the Cleveland Cabinets have been invited. The toast list is as follows:

"Mr. Cleveland as President," by David R. Francis, of Missouri, who was Secretary of the Interior under Mr. Cleveland; "Mr. Cleveland as Statesman," by Dr. Woodrow Wilson, President of Princeton University, with whom Mr. Cleveland was associated in his late years; "Mr. Cleveland as a friend," by Francis Lynde Stetson, who was Mr. Cleveland's partner in the practice of law; "Mr. Cleveland in politics," by William McAdoo, Assistant Secretary of the Navy under Mr. Cleveland, and "Mr. Cleveland as a Democrat," by Charles S. Fairchild, Secretary of the Treasury in the first Cleveland administration. The toastmaster will be William E. Curtis, former Assistant Secretary of the Treasury.

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BOARDWALK IS CROWDED.

First Big Throng at Atlantic City of the New Season.

Atlantic City, March 13.—Thousands of seashore devotees braved the northeast storm yesterday and to-day hoping that better weather would permit the expected big Sunday Boardwalk parade.
