NATIONALS TRIM CORNELL IN EASY FASHION, 7 TO 3

Collegians Make Two Runs Off Walter Johnson, But Fall Down Before Walker and Oberlin.

By WILLIAM PEET. The Nationals gave Cornell a good practice game at the Florida Avenue Park yesterday afternoon, winning rather easily 7 to 3. The New York State collegians were better pleased with the result than any game they have played thus far on their Eastern trip.

Williams said: "Your team certainly treated us white, and all during the game pointed out our weak points and offered advice, which will help a whole lot."

Eight Hits Off Goodwille. Goodwille, the college box artist, pitched a first-class game. He only allowed eight hits, and with the exception of the opening inning, kept them well scattered. Johnson, Walker, and Oberlin took turns in the box for Washington, and Walter was bumped for five swats. Walker held the college boys hitless, and only one bingle was obtained off Oberlin.

Manager McAleer made his first appearance on the coaching lines in a Washington uniform, and kept the men on the jump continually. Hardy was given his first chance of the season here to show what he could do behind the bat, and easily nailed the only man who tried to steal.

The Nationals as they started against Cornell yesterday will come pretty near being the line-up for the first game of the season against Philadelphia on April 14. Magner, the clever little Cornell shortstop, looks good enough for a major league berth. He has still another year at college.

Assistant Manager Peterson is responsible for this extended visit of the Cornell team to Washington. The collegians have more than made expenses, something they have never done before on a Southern journey, and to Mr. Peterson goes this credit.

Next Wednesday and Thursday Washington will play the Brooklyn club of the National League, and the fans will be given another opportunity to compare the two leagues.



LJUNGSTROM WINNER

Swede Establishes a New World's Marathon Mark.

Chevy Chase Golfer Beaten in Pinehurst Tourney.

Morning Round Proves Close and Exciting and Is Productive of Fine Golf.

Jim Crowley, of Ireland, Gets Second Place, Crossing Tape 2 1/2 Laps Behind Winner—Thore Johnson, Also a Swede, Finishes Third. Hayes Shows Poor Form.

New York, April 2.—Running in superb form from start to finish, Gustav Ljungstrom, of Sweden, won the marathon derby at the Polo Grounds this afternoon by two and one-half laps from Jim Crowley, of Ireland, with Thore Johnson, another Swede, in third place.

Ljungstrom ran 25 miles and 355 yards in 2:34:25.5, a new world's record. Last year's derby was won by Henri St. Yves in 2:40:52.5.

For eighteen miles Hans Homer showed vastly improved form over his recent indoor performances, and not only showed the way, but also broke the track record held by St. Yves and Alfred Scrubb for the entire distance.

Mat Maloney threw up the task after going fourteen miles. Percy Sellen, of England, stopped in the twenty-third mile, and Imberto Blast collapsed after covering nearly half the distance.

George Washington had six entries—Fleming, Rawlins, Bowen, Maxon, Smith, and Bryant. Of these, Fleming was the only point winner, capturing the two-mile run in 10 1/2 minutes.

Baltimore City College was represented by half a dozen men: Patterson, Beane, Lecato, Connolly, Bacon, and Timanus. Patterson won the dashes, Lecato was second in the half-mile and third in the quarter-mile, Connolly was first in the high jump and second in the broad jump, Timanus was first in the hammer throw, second in the shot put, and third in the broad jump. Bacon was first in the mile-run, Beane was third in the low hurdles.

PENN WINS AGAIN

Georgetown Unable to Connect with Marshall's Curves.

FOUR HOME RUNS ARE MADE

Pennsylvania Boys Touch Gray and O'Connor for Eleven Hits for a Total of Twenty-two Bases—Gibson Has Bad Day at Short—The Winners' Fielding Is Good.

Pennsylvania trounced Georgetown in a decidedly businesslike fashion yesterday on the hill by the generous score of 11 to 3, thereby making it two straight victories over the Blue and Gray, with the additional honor of being the only team to beat the Hilltoppers twice this year.

A larger crowd than that of Friday was on hand to watch the sport, and until the Georgetown nine fell hopelessly behind, cheered the Hilltoppers in their efforts to lead the contest. After the fourth session, the game was uninteresting, although when O'Connor relieved Gray at the end of this round, "Wab" temporarily checked the visitors.

Georgetown, instead of jumping into the breach and adding a few runs, then took to fanning the air, and with the exception of the eighth inning, did not get another runner over the pan. "Dolly" Gray, despite the handicap of a sore arm, volunteered to do the flinging, and started off fairly well in the first session. In the second inning he was hit for two home runs, both of which were largely a matter of luck, as the ball took a bad bound just as it neared the outfield in each instance, and hit a man, and in the third he hit two more, and allowed Smith to drop one of his choice ones over the right field bank for a complete circuit of the bases. This brought the runs for Penn up to five, but the Philadelphia annexed two more in the very next turn at the bat.

A. Thayer, the first man to face Gray in the fourth, hit for a home run to center, his second four-base wallop of the game, while Wood and Hayden singled and Gibson muffed one at short, all of this only netting the visitors two points. At the end of the fourth Capt. Murphy trotted out "Wab" O'Connor to line 'em over, and "Wab" proved to be far more steady than his predecessor.

Blue and Gray Weak at Bat. Georgetown's batting was way below par, only six hits being made in the game, the first inning, when no scores were made, being the only round in which two of the Hilltoppers' bingles came together. Gray was only at bat once, but "Dolly" managed to snap a peach of a single over second that counted Cogan.

Fran put up the same snappy bat that characterized their action on the field in the game Friday, and the two errors made by the Red and Black did not come at a time to cause the winners any pain. Smiley left Hunt's hard bouncer in the eighth get away from him after two were out, and Hunt was left on base when Murphy flew to center. Hayden's miscue was the result of a hard-hit ball by Gaynor in the eighth, which Hayden did not get in front of, the sphere rolling into right field. Dugan, who was on first when the ball was hit, continued on to third, and from there on to the plate, and by supporting the opposition scored.

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
