





WILL STUDY CAR CROSSINGS.

President Guide Trains Committee on Street Congestion.

President Guide, of the Chamber of Commerce, yesterday announced the appointment of the committee provided for by the action of the Chamber to look into the feasibility of widening F street, between Seventh and Ninth streets northwest.

This committee was provided for under a motion offered by Ernest H. Daniel, and it is understood that since the meeting President Guide has conferred with several members of the Chamber, including those of the executive committee, and that it was thought best to enlarge the work of the committee somewhat, with a view to placing before it several other street questions. For example, the subject of the four-track system for street cars on Fourteenth street, between New York avenue and H street, and on New York avenue, between Fourteenth street and Fifteenth street, will be considered by the committee.

It is understood that several other street railway crossings in the city will be looked into by the committee, with a view to a possible recommendation in the direction of the elimination of danger.

The committee is composed of B. H. Warner, John Joy Edson, J. L. Williams, W. T. Ballard, A. W. Hall, George C. Germain, W. C. P. Hazen, and R. N. Harper.
