Tournament at Chevy Chase Comes to End.

DOYLE BROTHERS DEFEATED

With President Taft to present the trophies and cups to the favored winners, and the United States Marine Band to lend an air of festivity to the occasion, the deferred events were run off at the Chevy Chase Club yesterday afternoon, and the third annual invitation tennis tournament came to an end.

Two contests of importance were scheduled. Mr. Johnson and Mr. Mahan met Messrs. C. B. and H. E. Doyle in the challenge round of men's doubles, and Miss Turle and Mr. Johnson were matched against Miss Wimer and Mr. Hills in the mixed doubles.

Many expressions of sympathy were heard for Mr. George Touchard, who is confined to his room in the bungalow with a serious attack of throat trouble. Mr. Touchard had not been feeling his best for some days, and exposure to the rainstorm of Sunday while motoring, developed a high fever.


Changsha Reported Quiet.

Richmond, Va., May 23.—Details of a riot at the Virginia penitentiary were made public by Supr. J. C. Wood today. Several men, mostly negroes, were injured. The trouble started when Guard E. W. Payne, in charge of the fitting room, ordered George Miller and W. M. Johnson, negroes, who were fighting, to sit down. Miller backed into a corner. The guard followed and struck him over the head with a club.


